

## Observe Penna. Week Oct. 10

Luzerne County is going all-out to assure the widest possible observance of Pennsylvania Week, October 10 through 17, it was announced today by Ross L. Leffler, of Pittsburgh, State Chairman.

Leading citizens of large and small communities in the County are busy forming local committees and planning for Luzerne's role in the gigantic State-wide tribute to the Commonwealth's historic heritage.

Home of Governor John S. Fine and Secretary of Commerce Andrew J. Sordani, Luzerne is part of an eleven-county Pennsylvania Week organization of the Northeastern Region, of which Victor C. Diehm, president of the Hazleton Broadcasting Corporation, Hazleton, is vice chairman.

Mr. Diehm pointed out that municipalities in Luzerne County are bending efforts to speed the development of local programs.

"Luzerne County will play an important role in the observance of Pennsylvania Week," said Mr. Diehm. "The resources of the County, its record of achievements, historical and cultural assets, and potentialities, are integral part of the greatness of the Commonwealth."

To consolidate planning behind the October observance, Mr. Diehm has appointed a special Advisory Board composed of A. J. Sordani, Jr., of Forty Fort; Mrs. J. Stewart Williams, of Kingston; Mrs. Warren P. Murphy, of Hawley; Willis Jones, executive secretary of Scranton Chamber of Commerce; and the following from Wilkes-Barre: Frank Burnside, former Luzerne County Chairman; Robert Eyerman, former State President of the Junior Chamber of Commerce; Vincent Gutendorf, 1952 Regional Vice President; Colonel Thomas Atherton, of Hotel Sterling; William Sword, and Herbert Morris. They will cooperate closely with William W. Davis, Wilkes-Barre, postmaster and Pennsylvania Week Coordinator of Luzerne County, and volunteer workers throughout the 11-county area.

Mr. Davis said the group seeks to formulate a program which will be "second to none in Pennsylvania."

Don H. Williams, attorney, has been appointed Wilkes-Barre Community Chairman by the Mayor of Wilkes-Barre, Luther M. Kniffen.

Joseph F. Saporita, Mayor of Pittston, has appointed C. William McNulty, chairman of the Activities Committee in Pittston.

Charles Prohaska, Burgess of Larksville, has been asked to issue a proclamation for a celebration of Pennsylvania Week in that community.

Irvin M. MacAfee, of MapVal Farm, Milan, has advised Mr. Diehm that he is developing a program with special emphasis on the observance.

Thomas J. Reese, Secretary of the Kingston Borough Council, in a letter to Secretary Sordani, has offered his cooperation in shaping a program at Kingston. Mr. Reese has named Burgess William I. Martin and Willard M. Jenkins, co-chairmen of the Pennsylvania Week committee there.

Olin W. Evans, Chairman of the Luzerne County Republican Committee has communicated with State Chairman Leffler, pledging assistance and cooperation of his organization.

Secretary of Commerce Sordani has appealed to all Mayors, Burgesses, Presidents of Chambers of Commerce, and local Editors, urging them to take the initiative in setting up a Pennsylvania Week committee and program.

### Practice For Minstrel Starts Wednesday At 8

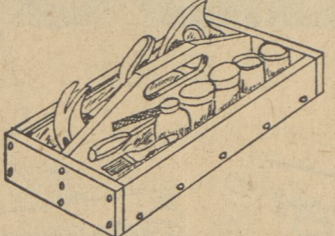

## HERE'S HOW ...

MAKE A TOOL BOX

A handy tool box or tool carrier made of wood will not injure the sharp edges of tools. It provides ready access to the tools, and the craftsman can see at a glance if he has all the needed tools before he starts a job.

A box approximately 8 by 18 inches will be sufficient for most repair work. Built of 1-inch lumber, it consists of six easily-produced pieces: A

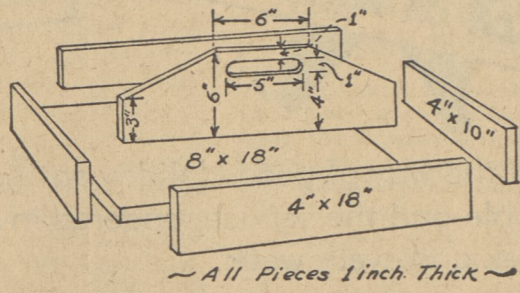


base or floor piece measuring 8 by 18 inches; two sides, 4 by 18 inches; two ends, 4 by 10 inches; and a separator-handle piece sawed from a piece 6 by 18 inches.

The handle is first drawn with pencil to produce the tapered design shown in the drawing. The hand-grip slot is made by boring a 1-inch hole at each end of the slot, and then sawing out the slot with a coping saw or keyhole saw. The slot edges may be smoothed with a rasp or sandpaper.

The handle is fastened in the center of the base with 2-inch wood screws (No. 7) from below. The side and end pieces likewise should be fastened with screws.

### CHECK THIS LIST

Here are the things you'll need to get that laying house ready for pullets coming in from the range:

- A SHOVEL — for cleaning out old litter right down to the floor.
- A BROOM — for dusting off walls and nests, roosts, doors, window sills and the like.
- A HAMMER AND NAILS — for tightening loose boards.
- PURINA DISINFECTANT — for scrubbing feeders and waterers; sprinkling on walls, nests, roosts.
- PURINA INSECT OIL CONCENTRATE — for mixing with oil and sprinkling on the dirt floor — kills carryover worm eggs, coccidia and all other common poultry disease agents.
