The township report showed balance of \$37,109.46 at the end of the 1953-1954 fiscal year ended in July. Receipts were \$162,460.62 against expenditures of \$125,351.16. The report shows assets of \$199,-832.63 and liabilities of \$10,000.

The joint district audit shows a balance of \$612.35. Receipts totaled \$147,952.77 against payments of \$147,340.42.


