Ambulance Races, Nobody Home

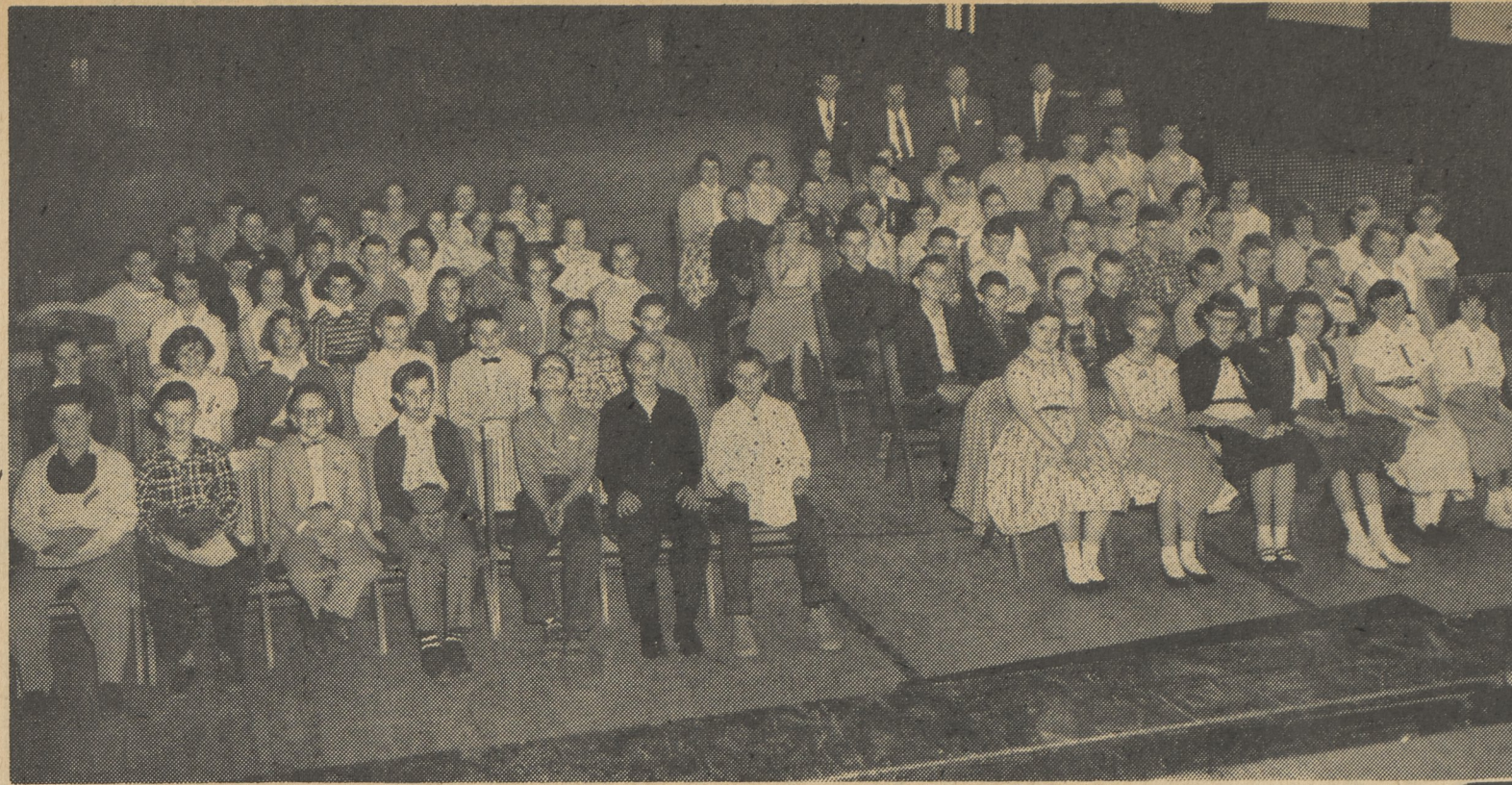

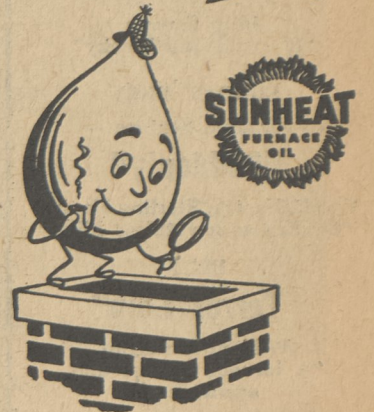
