W. M. Spencer Dies Aged 91

Had Youthful Zest For Life

Filled with a youthful zest for living to the last, ninety-one year old Washington M. Spencer, Hayes Corner, died Saturday afternoon. He was buried from the Richard Disque Funeral Home on Monday, Rev. William Heapps, Dallas Methodist Church, officiating. Interment was in Wardan Cemetery.

Mr. Spencer was recovering slowly from Broncho-pneumonia contracted in November, when he was stricken with a heart ailment and hospitalized at Nesbitt for a week in mid-May. "Give me my pipe and get me out of here," was his characteristic reaction to being confined in a hospital bed. He died two weeks after returning home, happy to be among his own family and mentally alert to the last.
