Heart disease is not unconquerable.

Not many years ago, a verdict of heart disease was regarded with about the same finality as a death sentence.

The fear and fatalism of heart disease is slowly but surely being dispelled.

The attitudes of both the physician and the public as regards heart disease is changing.

What has brought about this all-

tered opinion of a disease which causes one out of every two deaths in the United States?

There has been no amazing recent discovery of drug or other treatment that will cure heart disease.

There is nevertheless an awareness and growing recognition that something can be done and is being done about this enemy of mankind.

The sulfa drugs or antibiotics can check strep infection responsible for rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease.

It has been estimated that over 80 per cent of infectious heart disease among persons 5 to 25 years of age is due to rheumatic fever.

High blood pressure is now being lowered by new drugs and other drugs are now preventing the formation of crippling and killing blood clots.

New treatments of mothers against virus infections, better dietary regimes, and improved handling of glandular disorders are preventing many congenital heart defects.

New surgical techniques, many of them directly on the heart and heart muscles, are saving lives.

More than 785,000 people died in

this country last year from heart disease.

Medical science is making every effort to check this loss.
