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Good Light Makes For Better Sight

They should be given en-ough practical knowledge about good lighting to be able to get it when they need it and learn to realize that good light will make their work less tiring. In the early years of life, it is necessary that the child develops healthful habits of reading, writing and other close visual tasks. They should be encouraged to sit and stand erect and easy. Good seeing will make good posture easier to maintain. Work should be held at the proper distance and correct angle from the eyes and in the range of plenty of well diffused, well distributed illumination. The eyes should not be unnecessarily exposed directly to the sun or brilliant unshaded electric lamps.


