When the play-off game gets underway between Jackson and West Wyoming, however, an excellent game is assured.

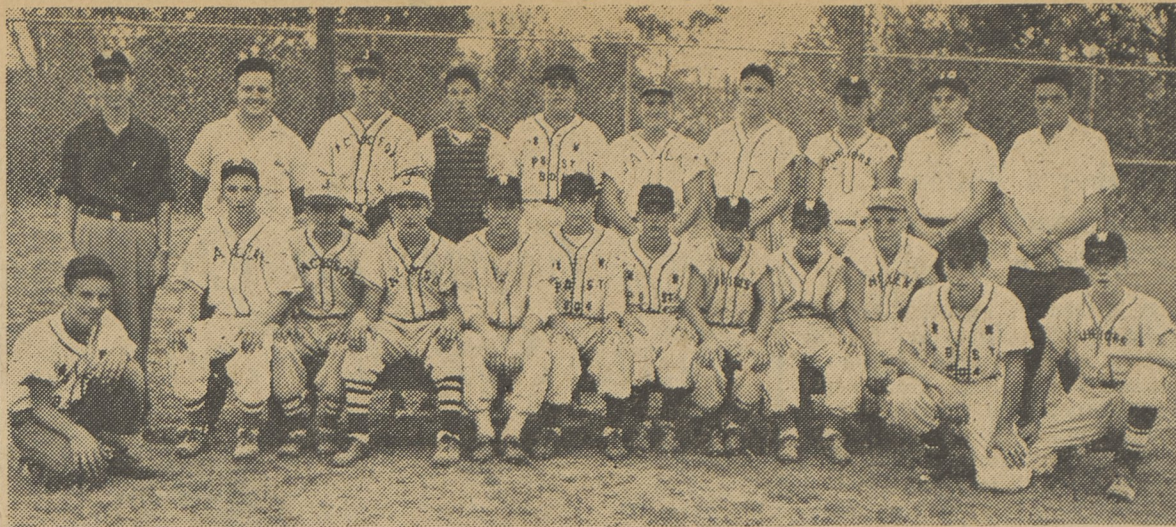
West Wyoming will depend on Starbuck and Charney to do the pitching with Pealer catching.

Jackie Robbins, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Robbins, Trucksville, was admitted to General Hospital on Wednesday for a series of tests.

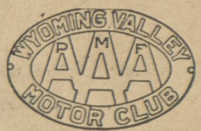

These AAA Safety Activities include:

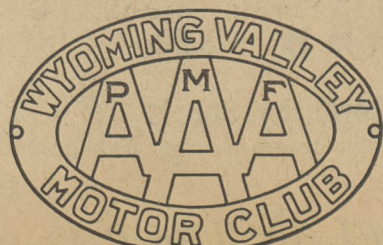
- **School Safety Patrols**
