Use Good Seed—Certified alfalfa seed costs just 3 cents a pound more than uncertified seed. If alfalfa is seeded at 10 pounds per acre, it costs just 30 cents more per acre to use certified seed, explains Albert Cooper, Penn State extension agronomist. He thinks this is a small

price to pay for purebred seed. Like Birdsfoot Trefoil — Many Pennsylvania dairymen have been well pleased with results obtained when birdsfoot trefoil has been used for pasture, silage, or hay.

Use Superphosphate — There are many advantages to using a superphosphate in dairy stables. It keeps down odors, helps keep the barn dry, helps destroy bacteria, and retards loss of nitrogen in the manure. Choose Right Rod—Be sure to choose the right welding rod for the metal you are working on, warns John Walker, Penn State extension agricultural engineer.
