Commonwealth **Subsidiaries** Ask To Merge

Three Companies Would Serve Some 55,557 Stations

An application has been filed by the Commonwealth Telephone Company of Dallas with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission for approval to merge its two subsidiary companies, Pennsylvania Community Telephone Company and Blakeslee & Fernridge Telephone Company with Commonwealth. The merger of the two subsidiaries with Commonwealth is a necessary step leading toward a permanent financing program. Such permanent fin-ancing, it was explained, is required to continue the large scale construction program that is presently in progress throughout the compan ies' service area.

In late spring or early summer, Commonwealth Telephone plans to upon approval by State regulatory authorities of the merger and State and Federal authorities of the company's financing program. It was stated that the companies' merger plans provide that the Commonwealth Company upon approval of the merger will file a tariff supplement adopting the existing rates to subscribers in the Pennsylvania Community and Blakeslee & Fernridge operating territories.

The two subsidiary companies, which are to be merged into Commonwealth, are owned by Commonwealth. Consolidation of operations in a single company will avoid duplication of administrative operations provided in the use of capital, supplies and equipment of a single company.

Serve 55,557 Stations

As of February 29, the three companies served a total of 55,557 stations as follows: Commonwealth, 38,155; Pennsylvania Community, gestions to offer. 16,941 and Blakeslee and Fernridge, 461. Together, they comprise the third largest of the more than 100 independent telephone companies in the State and are 30th in size of 5100 independents in the Nation.


