

**Sight Restored After Cataract Operation**

George Wilson, 80, is home again from Wyoming Valley Hospital, with sight restored to both eyes after Monday's operation. His horizon narrowed little by little as blindness increased, Mr. Wilson became totally blind six weeks ago. An operation for removal of cataracts was scheduled for September 4, the day his wife Elida died. Dismissed from the hospital, he entered again for the operation a few days after the funeral.

Since discharge from the hospital, he has been staying with Mr. and Mrs. Everett Wilson on Carr Street, Dallas. He has not yet visited his own home at Ruggles.

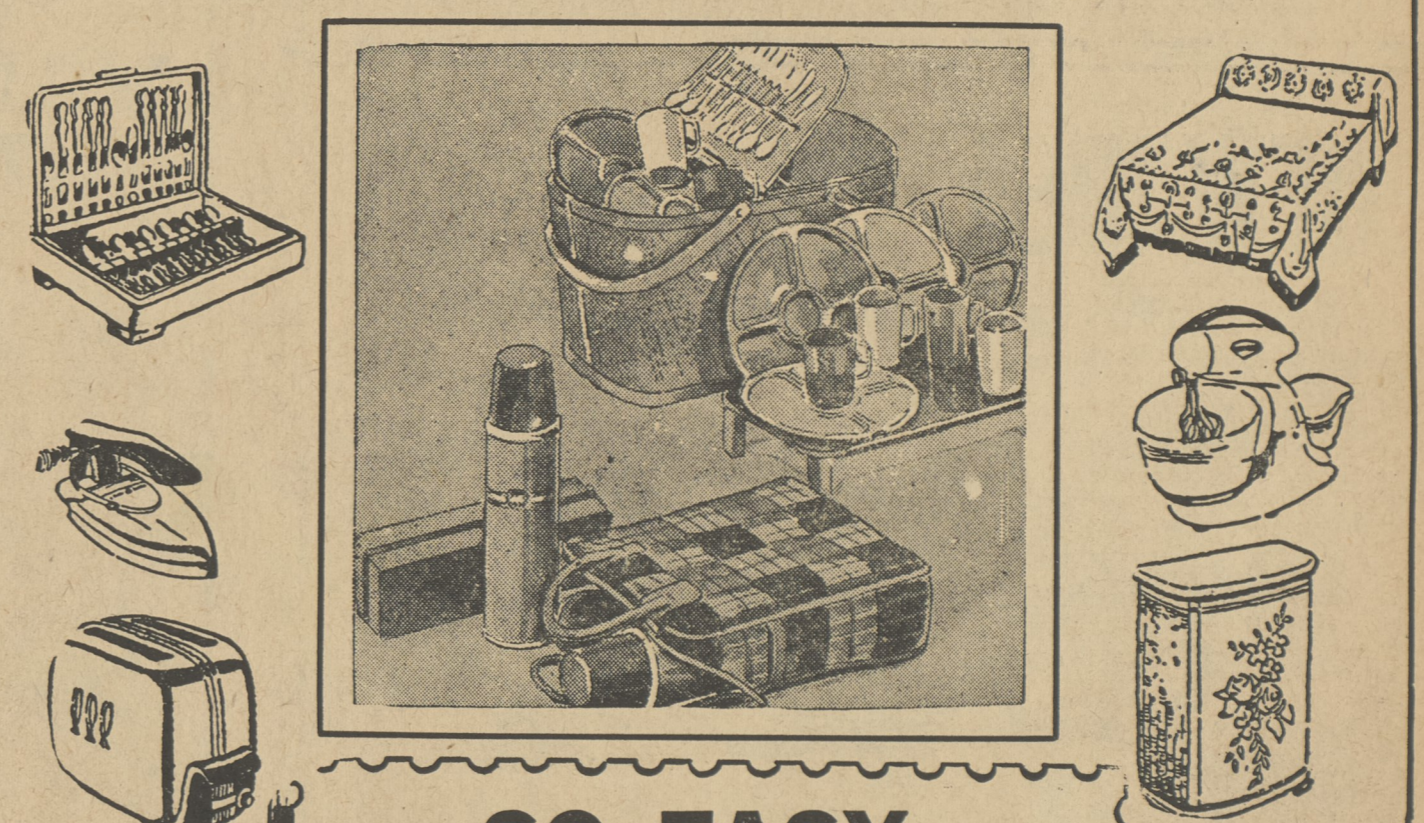
