Hordes Of Rats **Invading Area**

Shavertown Appears To Be Hardest Hit

An invasion of unusually large rats has been reported from widely separated parts of the Back Mountain region.

Most of those who have made a study of these rodents say that they do not usually invade homes and barns until later in the fall. Then sales of rat poisons jump at

local feed and drug stores. Rats of a larger variety than usual have been reported in numbers in the Terrace Drive and Mt. Airy sections of Shavertown and along Davis Street.

Residents of the Mt. Airy section will petition Kingston Township Supervisors to extend help in controlling the rodents.

Jesse Coslett, Chief of Police, says that the rats may be attracted by uncovered garbage pails and other debris and urges all residents to be careful with their garbage and to make sure that it is in covered containers.

There have been similar reports of rat invasions in Dallas Borough, Dallas Township and Lake Town-

Coslett has asked the Department of Health for assistance in exterminating the plague.


