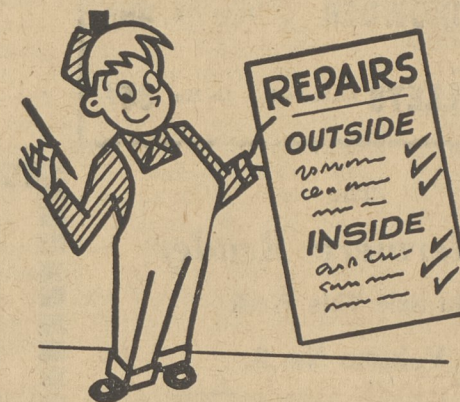

## DALLAS, HARVEYS LAKE and SWEET VALLEY EXCHANGE AREAS

New numbers for all telephones in these three central office areas will go into effect Sunday October 6 at 3:01 a.m. The new central office names will be ORchard for Dallas, NEptune for Harveys Lake, GReenleaf for Sweet Valley. Before you call, please consult your new telephone directory for the correct number.

To make a call within the exchange area simply dial the first 2 letters of the central office name in addition to the 5 figures. For example: to reach a friend in Dallas whose number was 4-3981, you will now dial OR plus 4-3981. Subscribers calling within the Harveys Lake exchange will dial NE plus the 5 figures and those within the Sweet Valley exchange, GR plus the 5 figures.

When calling long distance, continue to dial the operator. When she asks for your number, be sure to give her your complete number—the new central office name plus the 5 figures.



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
