Stanley Davies Passes Away

Love Of Family His Outstanding Trait

Stanley Davies, mortally ill for many weeks, was released Friday morning, dying at his home in Dallas only a few hours after a grandchild and namesake, Gordon Stanley Davies, was born.

Mr. Davies was buried Monday afternoon in Fern Knoll Cemetery. Services were conducted in Dallas Methodist Church by Rev. Russell Lawry, for one of the church's staunchest and most faithful supporters.

Pallbearers were: John Lloyd, Harold Croom, William Dohman, Jacob Seitchek, Donald Miller, and Joseph Jewell.

Surgery at Geisinger Hospital in Danville in May, proved futile. Mr. Davies died as he would have wished to die, in his own home, with his family close at hand. His most outstanding characteristic was love of his home and of his family, and the world of books.

At the time of his death at 69, he was president of the Royer Foundry and Machine Company, where he had been associated in business since 1924, after working for a time at the Vulcan Iron Works.

A native of Plymouth, son of the late James Bevan and Ann Smyth Davies, prominent in the anthracite industry, he was educated in Plymouth public schools, at Harry Hillman Academy, and at Wyoming Seminary.

Mr. Davies was a member of George M. Dallas Lodge 531 F&AM, Caldwell Consistory, and the Irem Temple.

He is survived by his widow, the former Elizabeth Bowen Kutznor of Wilkes-Barre, active in Girl Scout Council and in community life; three children: Mrs. Edward L. Stanley, Tokyo, Japan; Stanley S. Davies, Dallas; John K. Davies, Ridgewood, N. J.; ten grandchildren; a sister, Miss Leonore Davies, Wilkes-Barre; a brother, Bruce W. Davies, Forty Fort; Nieces and nephews include Mrs. Peter Clark, Mrs. John C. Phillips, and Bruce S. Davies Jr., Dallas.

A son, James B. Davies, lieutenant in the Air Corps, was lost in action over Germany in 1944.

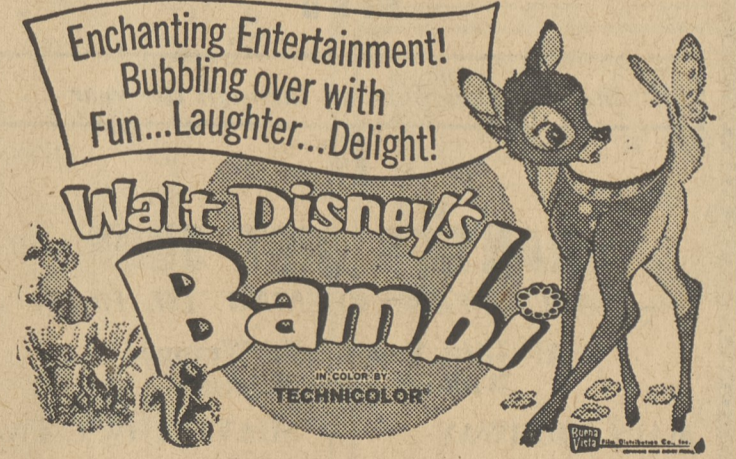

Water is again running low, however, and unless there is some relief shortly this may necessitate another shut-down.

The leather industry has stabilized, and with the closing of the firm's Sylvania, North Carolina plant, its other plants, at Parsons, West Virginia and Westover, Pa., are now working on a six-day schedule.
