## County's Share Of Federal Budget Is Greater Than Wages and Salaries

Luzerne County residents will be required to pay out approximately \$148,796,000 in Federal taxes as their share of the cost of the Federal spending program of \$73.9 billion proposed by President Eisenhower for the coming fiscal year, the Pennsylvania State Chamber of Commerce has estimated.

For Pennsylvanians as a whole, the potential cost in direct and hidden Federal taxes was placed at approximately \$5,276,000,000, an increase of \$264 million over Pennsylvania's share of the lower pre-Sputnik budget presented by the President a year ago.

The statewide share of the proposed budget was computed by the State Chamber on the basis of a statistically-weighted formula which shows that Pennsylvanians pay 7.14 percent of the cost of running the Federal government. If Congress cuts or increases the budget proposals, Pennsylvania's burden would fall or rise proportionately.

To make the county shares of the Federal budget burden more meaningful, the State Chamber released the following comparisons:

tax bill for Federal spending in the 1958-59 fiscal year is \$148,796,000 higher by \$56,013,000, than the total wages and salaries paid to employees in manufacturing in this county in 1956. The wage-salary total for Luzerne County in 1956 was \$112,783,000, according to the State Department of Internal Affairs.

rate would continue if money rates drop, which now seems likely.

A Suggested Investment Program  
Your letter is the letter of an intelligent man who has done some thinking. I'm going to suggest a plan to you that you can think about and discuss with your savings bank officers. First, I would leave a solid backlog in the savings banks amounting to \$5000. Based on the rates paid to me in my home town, I presume this will bring up in 3% or \$150 a year. Second, I would put \$5000 into Mutual Funds, also discussing with your banker the management and performance of the Fund under consideration. I think you should buy a balanced fund and one that yields around 3½%, exclusive of distribution from capital gains. I wouldn't count on the latter, although some may be expected when the market recovers. Your Mutual Fund investment would bring in, about \$175 a year. I'm suggesting a limited purchase of Funds mainly because the annual return on the better trusts is less than you appear to require. The return of stocks generally is because Mutual Funds must operate at a profit to live and you must pay them for the professional management which they devote to your investments. This payment is taken out of the income from securities held in the fund.

Balance Should Be Placed In Sound Stocks  
I would put the remaining \$15,000 of savings into a well-diversified list of sound stocks. These should represent an element of real growth to protect you against decline in the purchasing power of the dollar. The list should include some relatively stable stocks to provide a degree of protection against market fluctuations. Remember that all stocks, including Mutual Funds, will fluctuate to a greater or lesser degree. I have compiled a list for you to consider and to talk over with anyone in whom you have confidence. I suggest that you purchase 50 shares Baltimore Gas & Electric, yielding 4.9%; 30 Consolidated Edison, 5%; 40 Philadelphia Electric, 5.1%; 35 Standard Oil of New Jersey, 4.5%; 10 American Telephone, 5.2%; 20 American Tobacco, 6.1%; 25 General Electric, 3.2%; 40 American Cyanamid, 4%; 40 National Dairy, 4.5%; 50 Safeway Stores, 4%. These stocks are all listed on the New York Stock Exchange. Excluding commissions the entire list at present market would cost you a little over \$15,000. The annual return at present dividend rates would be \$735 or 4.7%. If this is weighted and combined with your savings bank and Mutual Fund investments the average return on a little over \$25,000 would be \$1060, or 4.1%.

of taxable real property of \$258,604,000. The latter figure was reported by the State Tax Equalization Board and covers assessments for county tax purposes in 1956.

Carrying these comparisons to the state level, the State Chamber reported that Pennsylvania's estimated Federal tax share of \$5,276,000,000 is over four-fifths as much as total wage and salary payments to manufacturing employees in 1956. The statewide wage-salary total was \$6,358,954,000. The statewide total

of property assessments for county tax purposes amounted to \$11,951,235,000, or only slightly more than double the potential one-year Federal tax bill of Pennsylvanians.

Individual county shares of the 1958-59 Federal budget cost were computed by the State Chamber by prorating the estimated statewide cost among the 67 counties on the basis of population, retail sales, market value of taxable real property, and estimated effective buying income.
