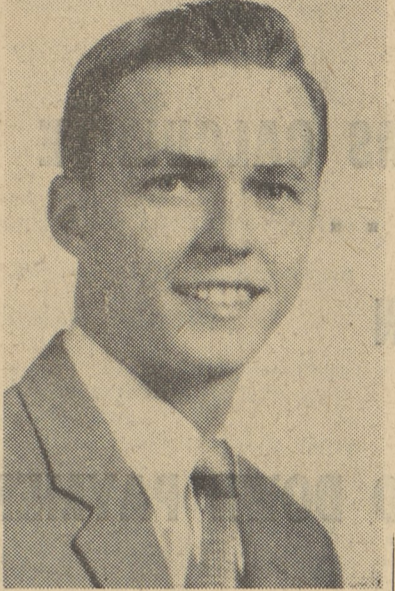
A reception followed at the bride's home.
