Lumber Industry Oscar, Paul Bunyan Award, Goes To Whitesell Brothers

Whitesell Brothers, Dallas builders, were among five lumber merchants of the Middle Atlantic area who received the highly coveted lumber industry "Oscar," the Paul Bunyan Award, at the Drake Hotel in Philadelphia, Saturday night, June 28.
An eminent panel of judges presented plaques of Paul Bunyan to Joseph Tenaglia, Emily Lumber Company of Philadelphia; Martin Cohen Hog Island Lumber Company, Philadelphia; Charles D. Hummer, Hummer & Green, Chester; Luther H. Schroyer, L. H. Schroyer Lumber Company, Boyertown; and Howard Whitesell of Whitesell Bros. Inc., Dallas, for "their foresight and imagination in advancing dynamic concepts of consumer selling, creative merchandising, and effective advertising to make American families aware of brand name products and a better standard of living."

The awards were presented at the Annual Lumbermen's Ball sponsored by the Committee for the Lumbermen's Forest in Israel, which instituted the awards last year as a means of focusing public attention to the "traditional graciousness of wood in the setting of contemporary living."
A highlight of the evening was the premiere of a new "Ballad of Paul Bunyan" by Edward Roecker, Jr., with words by William S. Gailor and melody by George Stark and Olivia W. Hoffman.

Burning Diesel Exhaust Sets Three Brush Fires

Trucksville firemen dealt with three brush fires set by burning carbon from the exhaust of a Lehigh Valley Diesel laboring up the steep grade on the afternoon of Fourth of July. Two broke out in the wooded area close behind the Kingsley residence adjacent to Lehigh Street, and one immediately after the train had crossed the trestle spanning Carverton Road within sight of the home of Vought Long, Trucksville fire chief. All fires were spotted instantly. Firemen turned out with brush-fighting equipment, and spectators enjoyed the free fireworks.
