Check Fit Before You Buy

Be sure a dress fits properly before you buy it, states Miss Bernice Tharp, extension clothing specialist of the Pennsylvania State University. An ill-fitting dress detracts from your appearance and makes you feel uncomfortable.

See that the collar fits closely at the neckline and doesn't pull away at shoulder seams. Make sure the dress covers your back and chest smoothly and has "give" through the shoulders. Move your arms to check that sleeves and armholes are comfortable and non-binding. See that the waistline is comfortable and at your natural waistline. Finally, check the skirt. It should be full enough over the hips so there is no strain, and the hemline should be even and at an attractive length.
