Marty Walsh, Overbrook Road, Dallas, has returned after spending several weeks in Europe.

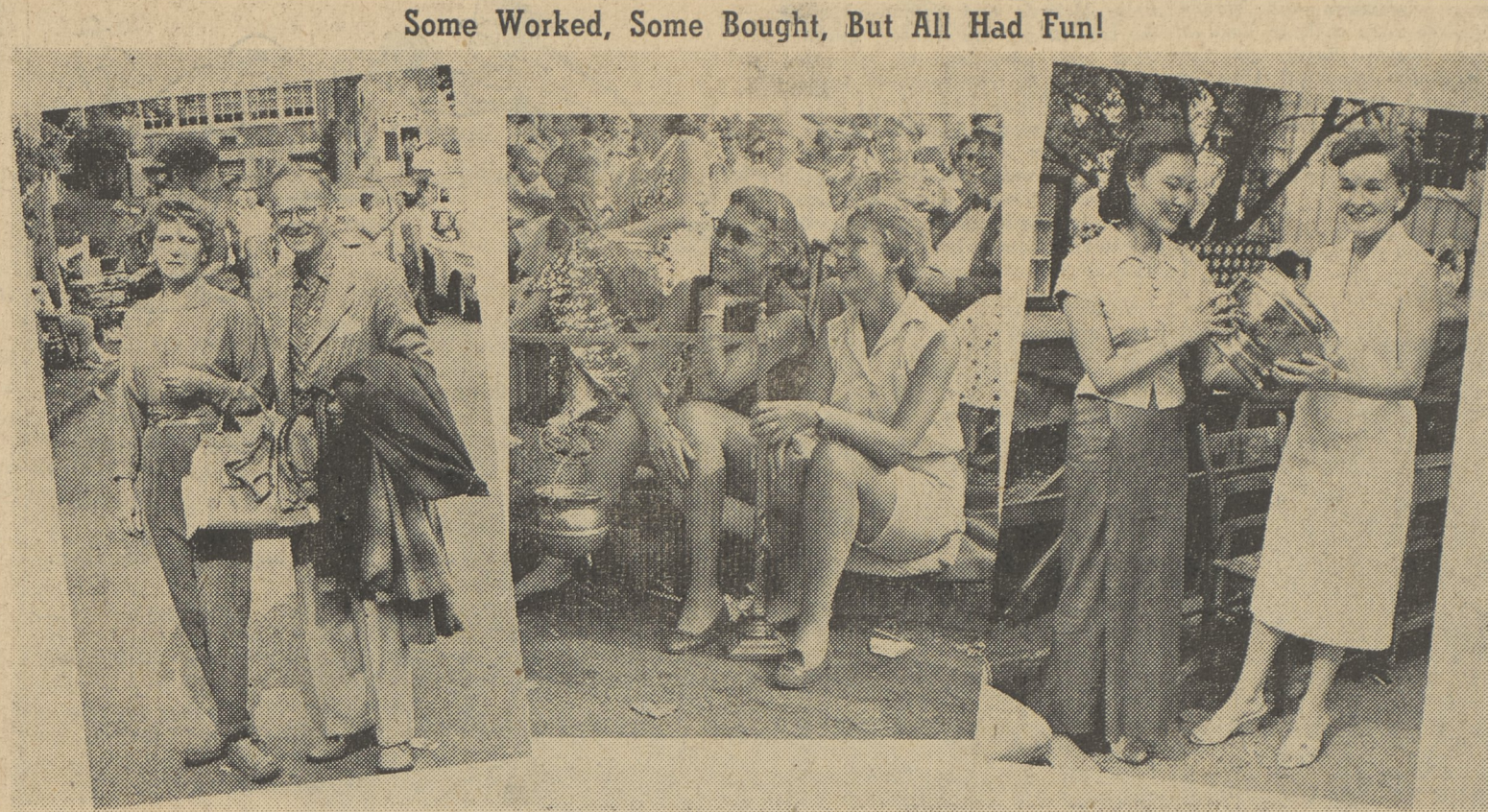

AUCTION BAKED GOODS BOOTH

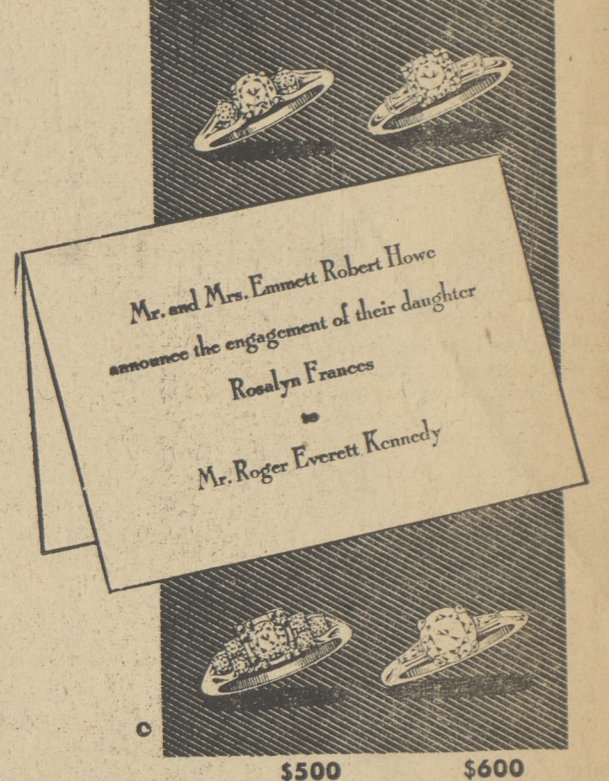
