BAUMHOLDER, GERMANY (AHT-NC)--Army PFC Vance B. Dwyer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Dwyer, E. Center st., Shavertown, Pa., recently participated with other personnel from the 8th Division's Infantry in Operation Wind Swept in Germany.

Operation Wind Swept, which included an attack against a simulated aggressor force under realistic combat conditions, was designed to determine unit effectiveness in cold-weather operations, and chemical, biological and radiological warfare defense techniques.

Dwyer, 20, a rifleman in the infantry's Company B, entered the Army in September 1958, completed basic training at Fort Riley, Kan., and arrived overseas last April.

He is a 1957 graduate of Westmoreland High School.

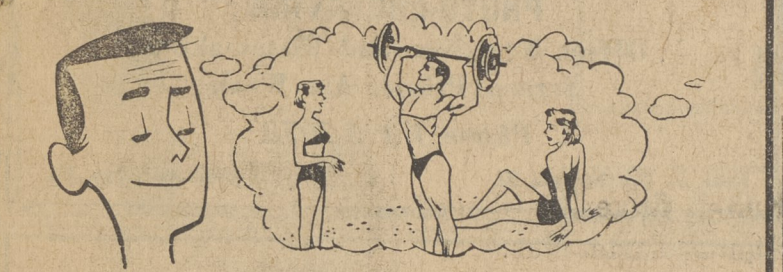
Dr. Robert Bodycomb, a trustee of the Pennsylvania State Dental Society, attended a Greater Philadelphia meeting Wednesday.

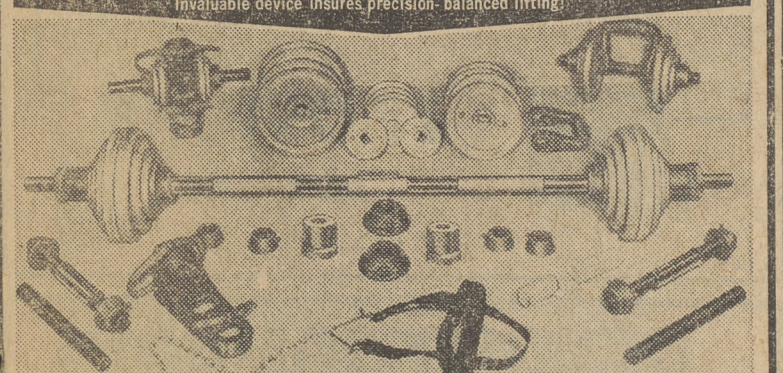
