

In a letter to the 18,000 physicians, who will give the physical examinations, the state health secretary told them they are qualified by training to measure physical, mental, emotional and physiological impairments to safe driv-

Dr. Wilbar said the medical examination program will start this year at a date to be set by the Department of Revenue. The first applicants to be examined will be those who apply for their first operator's license after that date. In 1961 all applicants for in-

itial operator's license will be examined, as will all persons who received their Pennsylvania driver's license prior to 1924.
