Strong pitching by Ron Swingle and timely hitting enabled Noxen to defeat Auburn 8-3 Sunday at Noxen.

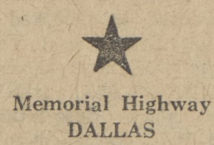
