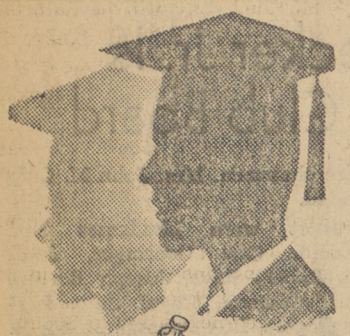
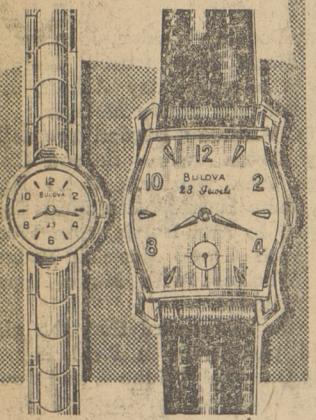


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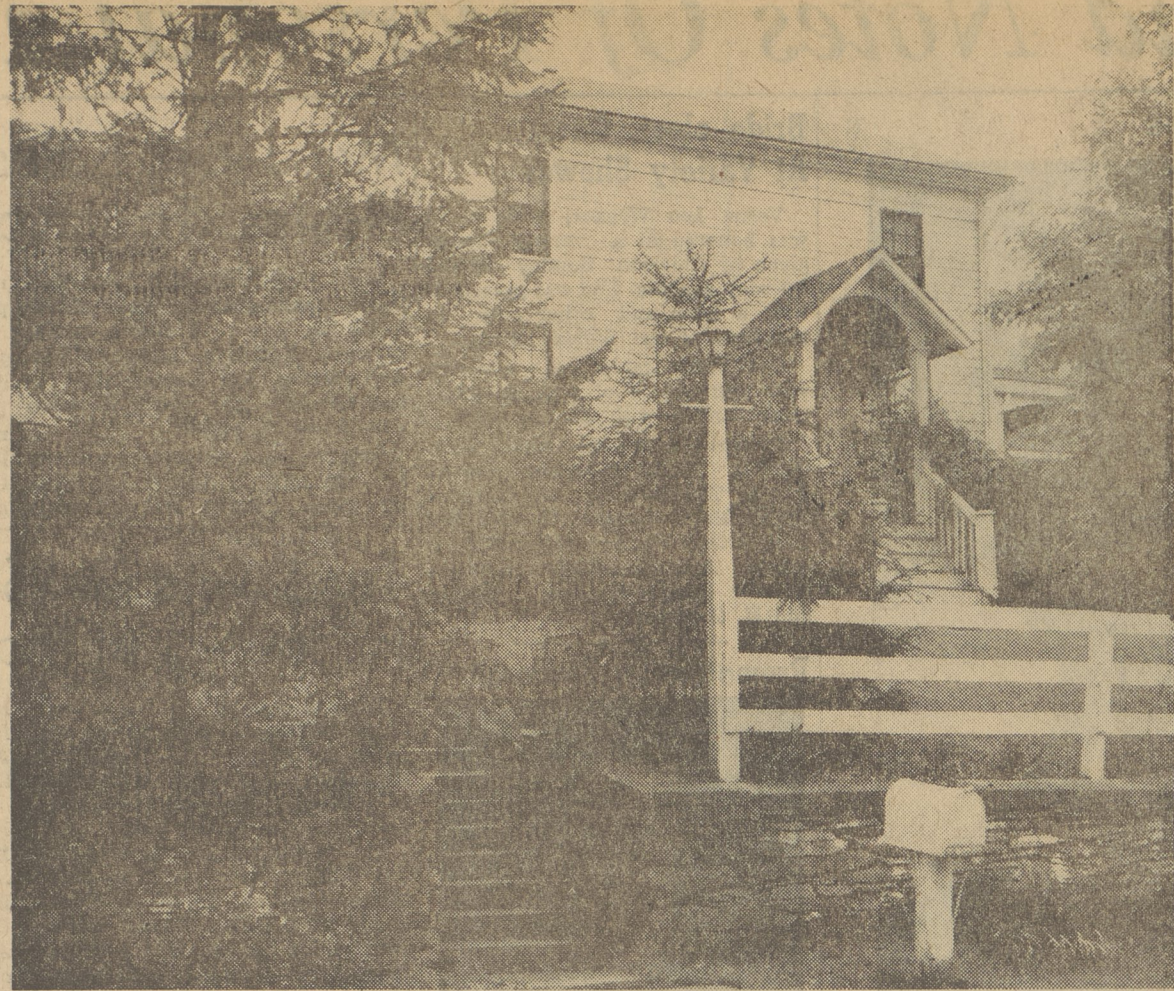
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McLean Home To Be Featured In Open House Tour

Carrier Trip Thrills Slaff

Guest Of Navy On Operation Alpha

"Thank God for the Navy" was the way Frank Slaff, Machell Avenue, expressed it after an exciting week aboard the Aircraft Carrier USS Randolph, flagship of Rear Admiral John E. Clark, commander of Carrier Division 16.

The carrier which is of the Essex class and is 900 feet long, with a complement of 2,300 men, was engaged in anti-submarine warfare in Operation Alpha off Norfolk, Va., under the command of Captain Richard E. Harmer.

Mr. Slaff in company with six other civilians was a guest of the Secretary of the Navy during the operations which were carried on while the Russians were invading President Eisenhower in Paris. "We kept abreast of the news," Mr. Slaff said. "I can tell you any American can feel proud to pay income taxes to support such a Navy as we have."

His companions were from Illinois, North Carolina, Indiana, Georgia and South Carolina. Television cameras took pictures of the entire operation. The pictures will be shown on television on Twentieth Century with Walter Cronkite as narrator early in September.

Mr. Slaff and his companions left the carrier while it was still 800 miles at sea. Their plane was catapulted off and they landed in Norfolk.

Mr. Slaff's son, Commander Allen Paul Slaff is with Admiral Arloe Burke in Europe.

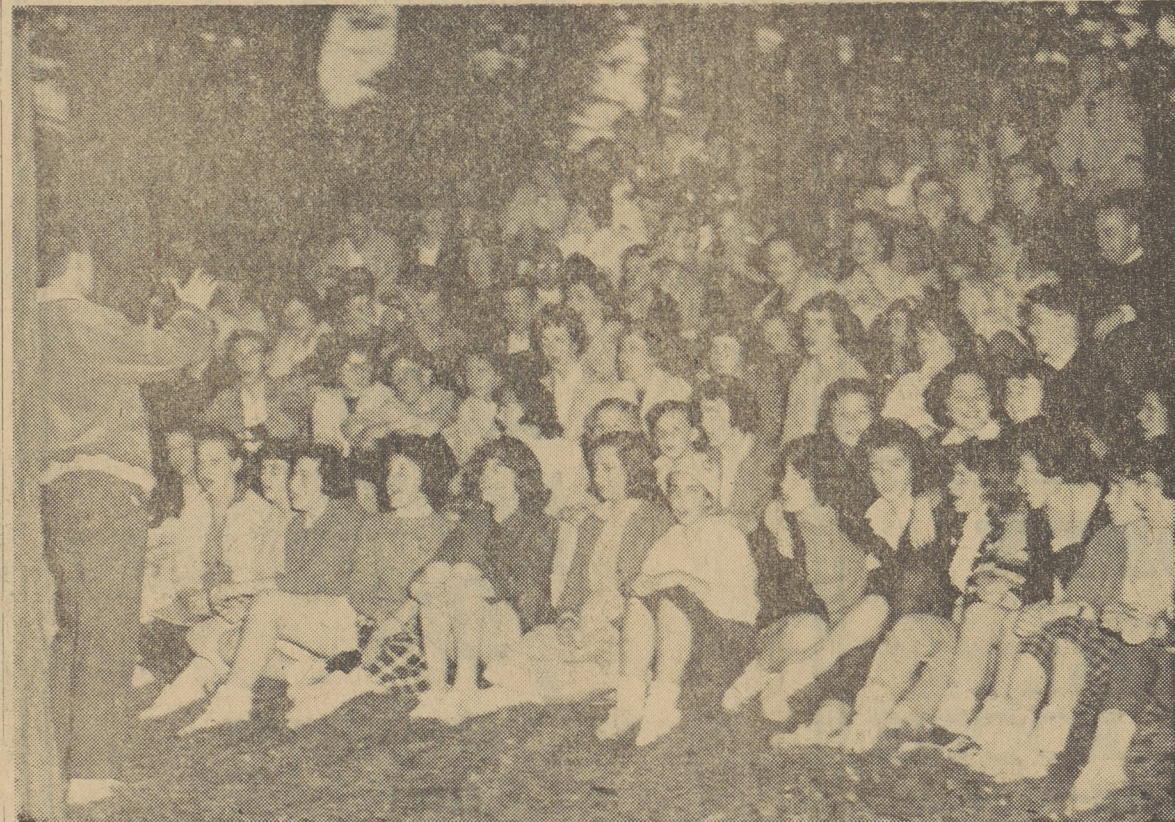

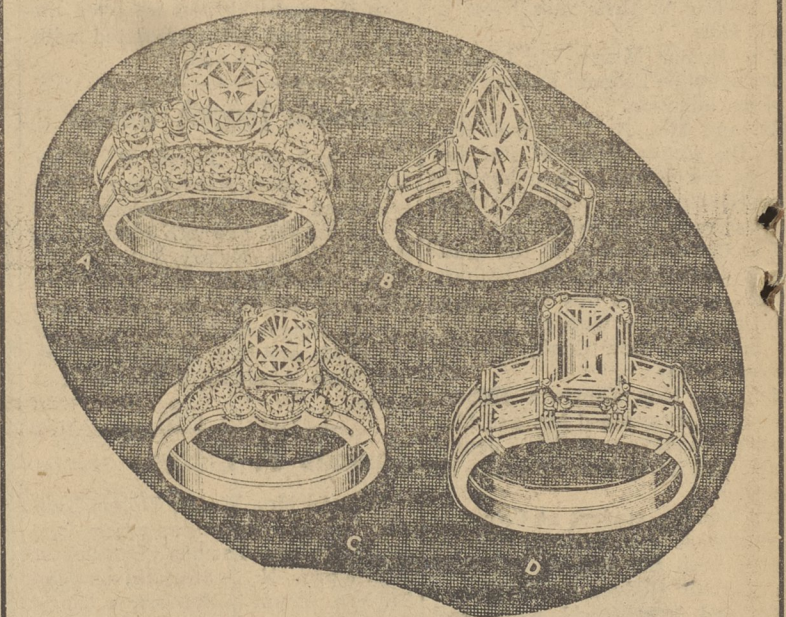
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
