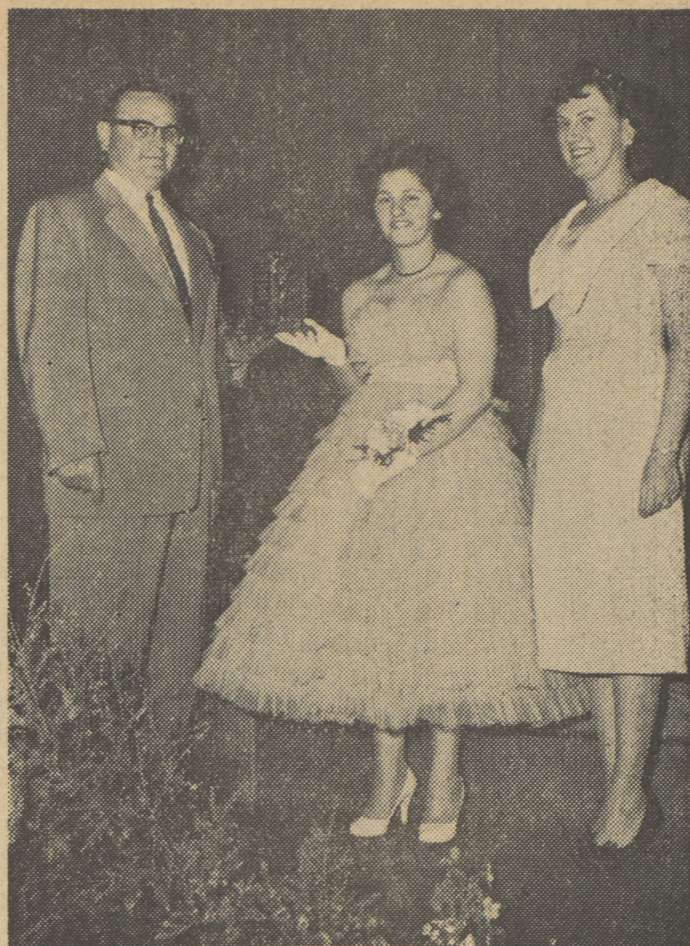

H. L. Light Co. To Reduce Rate

3,429 Customers Will Benefit

Some 3,429 Harveys Lake Light Company customers in Luzerne and Wyoming Counties will benefit by a reduction in rates approved by the Public Utility Commission.

The PUC said the utility, one of nine electric power firms whose earnings are being checked by the commission, agreed to a \$25,991 annual rate reduction after a series of conferences with the commission staff.

A spokesman for the light company said previously the first 10 kilo-watt-hours cost \$1 to residential customers. The new rate will be 11 kilo-watt-hours for \$1.

The next 45 were eight cents per kilo-watt-hour, while the new 45 will be seven cents per a kilo-watt-hour. The next 45 was six cents a kilo-watt-hour, while the new will be five cents. All over 101 kilo-watt-hours will be three cents, the spokesman said.

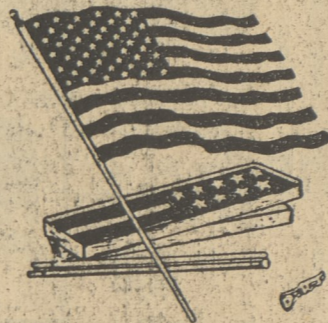
He said commercial users will get a reduction accordingly.

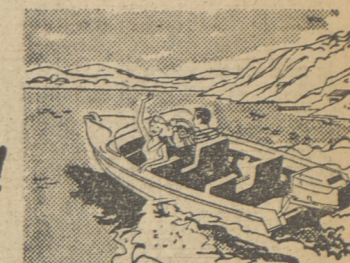
In Contest Finals

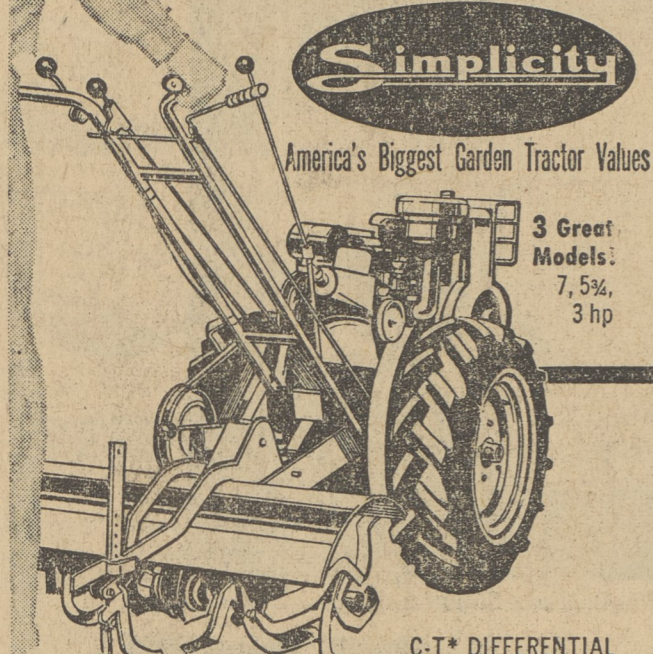
