

NOTICE TO RESIDENTS OF LUZERNE COUNTY WHO ARE OWNERS OF STOCKS, BONDS, MORTGAGES AND OTHER SECURITIES

1961 Personal Property Tax Returns FOR COUNTY PURPOSES.

Every resident individual, copartnership, company or corporation, including executors, administrators, trustees and guardians, in the County of Luzerne, holding personal property taxable under various acts of the Pennsylvania Legislature is required to file return thereof to the Personal Property Tax Department between January 15th and February 15th, 1961. Tax Rate Four Mills.

All mortgages owned, promissory, judgment notes or bonds given by individuals, judgments; public loans or bonds, notes, etc., issued by corporations, shares of stock, shares in mutual funds and investment trusts, and articles of agreement, etc.

If you did not receive a return blank, one may be obtained at the office of Personal Property, Room 3, Court House, Wilkes-Barre. If you are in doubt as to the taxability of securities or other personalty held, or desire assistance in the preparation of your return, communicate with the Personal Property Tax Office.

Any person who wilfully refuses or fails to file a Return as required by law shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and may be subject to fine or imprisonment, as set forth in the aforesaid acts. In the absence of a Return taxes may be assessed upon estimate of holdings and security holder subjected to penalty of 12 per cent tax.
