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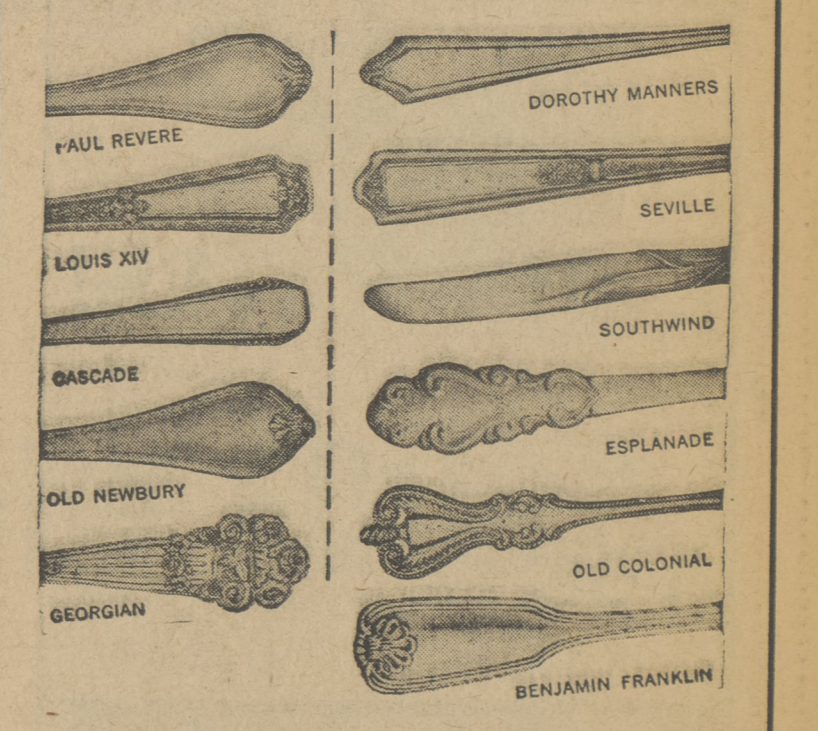

Library Book Club Hears Talk On Back Mountain Paper Mills

Ralph Hazeltine spoke to members of Back Mountain Memorial Library Book Club Monday afternoon, sketching the history of the paper industry, one of the most important of the early 1800's in this area. "From Rags to Riches" was the title chosen by the speaker, who was introduced by Miss Frances Dorrance.

Mr. Hazeltine located the early paper mill as at the big bend on what used to be a toll road leading to Luzerne. Water power operated the machinery. Paper in those days was not made from wood pulp, but from rags, which produced a paper of great strength and durability. The mill, erected in 1810, flourished until 1833. By 1845, only hand-made paper mills remained, the last of an industry which laid the foundations for a commercial empire.
