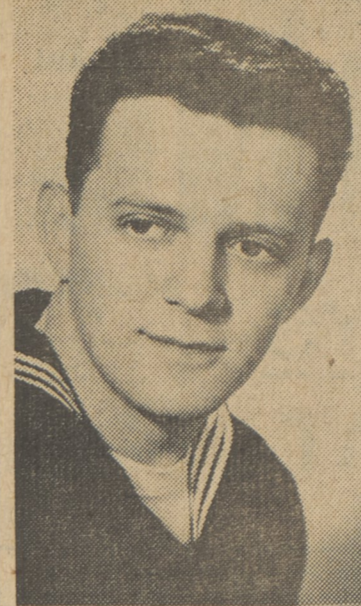
**Westmoreland Band
