**Editor McDonald College Speaker**

Mass Entertainment Media and Family Life will be the topic of College Misericordia's next cultural series speaker, Donald McDonald, the young editor who is pioneering a new type of quarterly in his venture, "The Marquette University Magazine." Mr. McDonald will come to Misericordia on March 6 and will speak in Walsh Memorial Auditorium that evening at 8:00. In his discussion he will examine the nature of the mass entertainment industries and their influence on family life.

Donald McDonald founded "The Marquette University Magazine" less than a year ago to dramatize and explain the aims of higher education in general and Marquette University in particular. The magazine is unique in its field. Before going to Marquette, Mr. McDonald had established an enviable reputation as an intelligent, pace-setting diocesan editor of "The Catholic Messenger" at Davenport, Iowa.

Mr. McDonald also writes a monthly column, "Second Thoughts," for "America" and contributes to many other periodicals. His recently published book, "Catholics in Conversation," has been reviewed with praise by both secular and Catholic publications.

Born in Green Bay, Wisconsin, McDonald attended a parochial grade school. After graduation from a public high school he worked for an insurance company. Here he probably would have stayed, doing clerical work and accounting if World War II had not intervened. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps and was impressed by the example of a friend—a graduate of Marquette College of Journalism. Returning to civilian life, McDonald enrolled at Marquette and stayed for both his bachelor's and master's degrees in journalism.

Mr. McDonald is known as a forthright columnist, a perceptive critic, the writer of challenging articles, and the maker of controversial speeches who is able to leave a challenge with his audience.
