She Was A Loving Mother And Grandmother

Four years ago, at about this time of year, the Dallas Post published a feature story about a woman of 93 who was keeping herself young by making a happy home for her son and a houseful of grandchildren.

This week, we publish the picture taken to accompany the feature story, showing Cathie Lou and Barbara Ellen watching while Granny baked, and write regretfully that Mrs. Elizabeth Brady Engelman is dead.

At 97, the oldest resident of Noxen, she passed away at the Lane Nursing Home in Tunkhannock, where she had been a patient since being transferred there from the Carpenter Home a year and a half ago.

She was buried in Orcutt Cemetery Saturday afternoon, Rev. Wesley Kimm, pastor of St. Luke's Lutheran Church, officiating at services from the Engelman home.

After rearing five children of her own, and caring for four grandchildren when their mother, Mrs. Katherine Engelman, a teacher at Lake Noxen Schools, died, Mrs. Engelman was able to cope with almost anything. When the hurricane of 1955 struck Noxen, mowing down trees and wrecking the porch and roof of the house where she had set up housekeeping with her husband, Edward (more generally known as E. Y. B.) sixty years earlier, she took it in her stride, comforting the smallest of the grands, Cathie Lou, lighting candles in the dark to reassure her. It was pretty scary, there in the house alone with the

baby, while her son, Edgar, was outside in the torrential rain guarding the broken power lines which were writhing in flashes of blue flame on the roadway.

Mrs. Engelman reminisced about many things, those long past and those more recent, the way things used to be in Noxen, and the changes that had come to the community since the late 1800's.

She posed, upon request, with her Bible and her house-plants. It was a lovely picture, but the one taken in the kitchen with her little grandchildren, busily stirring up something good for them to eat, was more typical of a wife and mother and grandmother who had never spared herself in service to those she loved.

She was a charter member of St. Luke's Lutheran Church, built just two doors down the street from the family home which she and her husband had built to accommodate their growing family when they first moved to Noxen.

The couple lost a little boy, Norman, when he was five years old, and a daughter forty years ago. Mr. Engelman died sixteen years ago.

Mrs. Engelman was born in Indiana County, daughter of the late James and Eliza Hannah Brady.

She is survived by three sons: Benjamin, Howard and Edgar, all of Noxen, fourteen grandchildren, twelve great-grandchildren, and a number of great-great-grandchildren; two brothers: George Brady, of Vanderbilt; Jesse, Rochester.
