Supervisor Candidate



Louis Ranier is a candidate for Kingston Township Supervisor, running on the Republican ticket.

Mr. Ranier knows what it is to live on a limited budget. When he was ten years old, as a Scranton boy, he left school for a time to work in the breakers, netting himself fifty cents a day and a thrashing from his father, a contract miner, for interrupting his education. He went back to school, but abandoned formal education entirely when he was fourteen.

Mr. Ranier typifies the many people in the area who must live on a fixed income of modest proportions, who own homes, and who view with alarm the recent and continuing skyrocketing of taxes.

In 1947 he gathered names for a petition to keep taxes down.

Mr. Ranier attends most of the Dallas School Board meetings.

He has lived in the Back Mountain since 1924, working for the Kingston Coal Mine until it closed in 1939; later for the Glen Alden, and for the Penn Tobacco Company. In 1950, he retired.

He recalls that he volunteered for military training with the National Guard during World War I when placed in a deferred classification, and won a medal for marksmanship the first time on the rifle range.

Fred Anderson Asks Reelection

Frederick W. Anderson, seeking reelection as Justice of the Peace in Kingston Township, has been a resident of the Township for twenty-one years.

Originally elected as Justice of the Peace in 1955, Squire Anderson feels that his almost six years in the office qualifies him for reelection, as a thoroughly experienced Justice of the Peace who can be of service to the community. Experience, he says is acquired only after years of study and practice.

Mr. Anderson was born in Wilkes-Barre and educated in the public schools, Wyoming Seminary and Wharton School of Finance. He is married to the former Dorothy C. Bamert, R. N., and is the father of two children, Fred, Jr., and Flora Sue. He maintains an office in his home at 120 N. Pioneer Avenue, Shavertown.

An active member and congregational secretary of Trinity Lutheran Church of Wilkes-Barre, he is member and past president of Dallas Kiwanis Club, member of George M. Dallas Lodge, F&AM, and Shavertown Fire Company, and is secretary-treasurer of Carverton Rod and Gun Club.

Dallas Kiwanis Hears Chet Tyson On Africa

Chester J. Tyson, Jr., of the U. S. Department of Agriculture addressed Dallas Kiwanis Club May 3 at the Irem Temple Country Club. "Chet" has been with the Department of Agriculture since 1939, and last year was borrowed by the State Department to make a six months trip through fourteen countries of Africa in order to observe agriculture procedures in these countries and to suggest how improvement might be made.

twelve-year old, 11,170 pounds of milk, 552 fat; Sterling Lustrus, junior three-year old, 10,000 pounds of milk, 517 of fat; Sterling Honor, junior two-year old, 8,010 milk, 445 fat.

Sterling Fontana, senior three-year old 303 days, produced 11,730 pounds of milk, 658 fat. Sterling Carmel, five-year old, milked for 302 days, gave 10,570 pounds of milk, 505 fat.

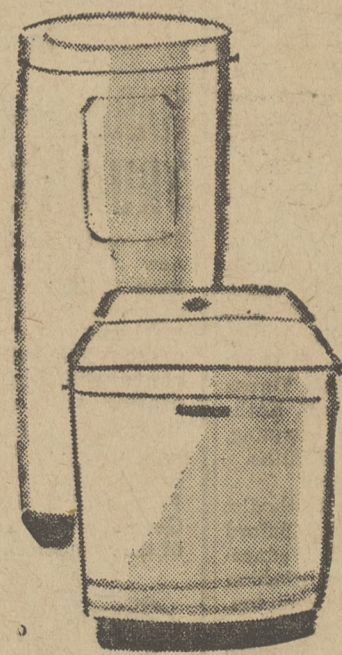

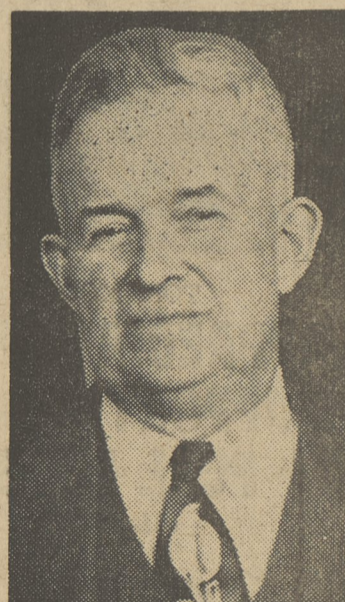
