

Suggestions For Improving Your Rural Mail Box

The Post Office Department listed these suggestions for rural mail box improvement:

Boxes that are not properly erected, or not maintained in good serviceable condition retard the delivery of mail and expose it to the weather.

Boxes which are no longer serviceable should be replaced.

Name of box owner should be inscribed on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, or on the door if boxes are grouped.

Boxes and supports should be kept painted preferably white, but other colors may be used.

Mail boxes on rural and star routes must be located on the right side of the road in the direction of travel of the carriers in all cases where traffic conditions are such that it would be dangerous for the carriers to drive to the left in order to serve the boxes, or where their doing so would constitute a violation of State or local traffic laws and regulations. The approaches to boxes should be filled and properly graded and unobstructed at all times.

The annual rural mail box improvement program—to assist the Postal Service in providing more efficient deliveries and to stimulate efforts to improve the appearance of the countryside—will be held May 15 to 20, the Post Office Department
