Before an accident happens, inspect the wiring for safety. Then, f your wiring needs to be replaced. Mrs. Darbie offers these suggestions: See that wiring bears the label of the Underwriters' Laboratory. UL is the symbol to look for.

Make sure wiring is the correct size for its use.

Use adequate wiring of high quality materials to guard against unnecessary replacements and extra cost for materials and labor.

Have wiring installed according to the national and local electrical codes and have a qualified electrician install it.
