Bees Are Swarming -- Honeybees often get the urge to go swarming at this time of year, and if a swarm of bees seems to be moving in permanently on your premises, a call to any nearby beekeeper will get

the unwanted guests moved.

Light Up -- An effective farrivard lighting system is an aid to safety and convenience. Penn State extension agricultural engineers suggest a combination of yard lights on poles and flood lights located over

entrances to farm buildings.

Kill Quackgrass -- Don't wait juntil a field turns green with quackgrass before going over it again with a field cultivator, warns George Berggren, Penn State extension agronomist. Cultivate the field often enough so the roots can't get estab-

INSECT SPRAYS CAN BE INJURIOUS TO DOGS

By Dr. E. M. Gildow Director, Friskies Research Kennels Summer is the big season for spraying to control the invasion of insects. On farms, orchards and ground crops are sprayed and, around the house, it's the lawn trees and plants. Many of the chemicals used

in these sprays can be injurious to dogs, even those supposedly



prove poisonous if licked, inhaled or absorbed through the skin.

It is advisable to keep your pet in the house, therefore, when spraying is being done in your vicinity.

Be sure the affected area has completely dried before you re-lease your pet. Even then, there is some danger if grass is licked or eaten. Be particularly careful on the heavy, muggy day when the spray hangs suspended in the air for a considerable length of time and takes longer than usual to dry. Should your pet become ill

and spray is the suspected cause, here's a sensible course of action to take.

Keep your pet warm and quiet. Don't get flustered, for this will excite your pet. Try to find the name of the spray and copy down its list of ingredients.

Make a note of your dog's
symptoms and actions and then
call your veterinarian. By having everything down in writing, you won't omit some information that may prove vital in helping your veterinarian prescribe an antidote.

After administering it to your pet, take him immediately to your veterinarian who will be. waiting for you at his office. Don't waste any time, for speed in such cases may mean the difference between life and
