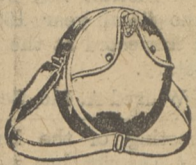

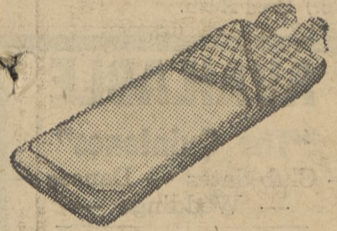
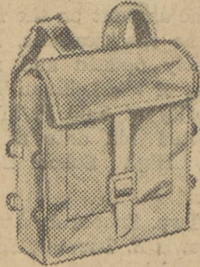

Foundation Garments — Nearly every foundation garment should be checked on the seated figure, reminds Mrs. Mae Barton, Penn State extension clothing specialist. A woman's proportions change when she sits. The waist and diaphragm expand and push flesh up to the bust, the back lengthens, and the thighs spread. The garment must expand and be long enough to provide bending room.

Vitamin Pills — Taking vitamin pills regularly do not assure you of being well-nourished. Vitamin pills are expensive, and are a poor substitute for a good diet. Penn State extension nutrition specialists point out that a haphazard diet bolstered by vitamin concentrates may be lacking in calories, protein, minerals, or in some vitamins yet unknown. However, vitamin pills are valuable in infant feeding, in cases of inadequate diets, or of increased needs.

Rules for Children — Children need rules to live by, says Mrs. Marguerite Duvall, Penn State extension family life specialist. They need limits, and they need to consider other people's rights and feelings, too. Rules help children know what to expect. A child will have more respect for you and also for himself if he is helped gently but firmly to do the things he should.

Quality Bed Linens — Sheets and pillowcases should be free from defects as flaws reduce wearing qualities, states Erma Langford, Penn State extension home furnishings specialist. Quality linens should have an equal number of threads woven crosswise and lengthwise. Smooth, evenly stitched hems add to attractiveness and durability, and tape selvages add strength to the sides of sheets. Be sure to read the label for sheet and pillowcase sizes. Also know the sizes you need.

Few Motorists Fail Eye Test

In the first month of testing state employees under the physical re-examination of drivers, State Police found 585 workers in need of some kind of eye correction in order to qualify for drivers' permits.

Under orders from Governor David L. Lawrence, some 25,000 state employees who use their own or Commonwealth vehicles for state business began taking the re-examination September 12. The state workers were the first group of drivers to be re-examined under Pennsylvania's new periodic re-examination program instituted this year. Applicants for learner's permits have been required to submit to the test as a prerequisite for

vehicle operation since last June.

Reporting on the results of the first month's vision test of 13,783 state workers, State Police Commissioner Frank G. McCartney said the 585 employees were referred to optometrists or ophthalmologists (oculist, and M. D.) for treatment or correction of vision before their operators' permits could be approved.

The commissioner emphasized that his report covered only the first phase of the re-examination, the vision test conducted by State Police. After qualifying in this phase, employees must submit to an examination by a physician for final certification of ability to operate a vehicle safely.

The physician's examination covers neurological disorders, car-

diac and circulatory disorders, alcoholism, narcotic addiction, diabetes, epilepsy and conditions causing repeated lapses of consciousness.

Employees who successfully complete the re-examination will be issued special permits by the Inter-Departmental Safety Council, authorizing them to operate motor vehicles on Commonwealth business. The permits will be valid until a record of the examination can be made on the employee's regular operator's permit, probably on the 1961 permit to be issued next January.

Those who fail to meet the re-examination standards will be afforded a hearing by a Board of Review before their operators' permits are suspended.

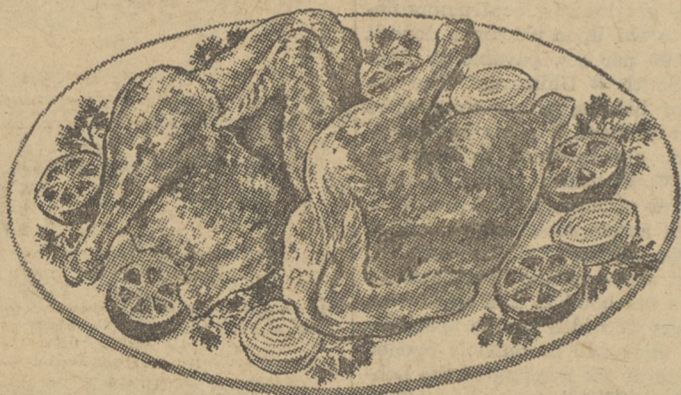
