HOME CALENDAR

Home Canning — It is not safe to can nonacid vegetables, such as peas and asparagus, in a boiling water bath, an oven, a steamer without pressure, or an open kettle. None of these will heat the vegetable hot enough to kill dangerous bacteria in a reasonable time. Processing in the steam-pressure canner is recommended for all vegetables except tomatoes and pickled beets. **Carpet "Grin"** — A carpet that grins at you is not the one to buy, cautions Dorothy O'Donnell, Penn. State extension home furnishings specialist. "Grin" is the term used when a carpet lacks enough fullness to wear properly. A test for "grin" is to bend the carpet back on itself so you can see the tufts exposed right down to the backing. If tufts are noticeably and widely spaced, you are seeing carpet "grin." **Wash-and-Wear** — Check a garment of a wash-and-wear fabric carefully before buying, reminds Mrs. Mae Barton, Penn State extension clothing specialist. Look for quick-drying shoulder pads, seam tapes, waistbands, and inner pockets. Nylon seam dries in a short time. Look for labels and read them carefully for fiber content, and for construction and laundering information. **Appliance Gift** — Consider versatility when selecting a small electric cooking appliances for a wedding gift. An appliance that will do many different jobs may be a better choice for a newly married couple than an appliance that does only one job.

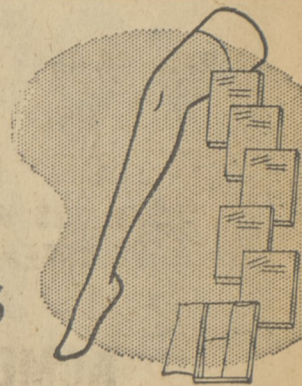

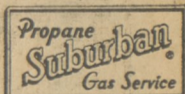
