Some of the material is suitable for doll quilts and other items, rather than doll clothes, and these things will be the basis for a winter program of sewing, looking toward the 1962 Auction.

Five Industrial Loans Approved In Area

Among nine loan applications for new industrial projects in Pennsylvania approved by the Pennsylvania Industrial Authority were three in Luzerne County and two in Scranton. In Wilkes-Barre they were given a loan of \$177,600 to the Committee of 100 Inc., toward a \$600,000 plant being occupied by Leslie-Henry Company for the production of toys, with planned employment of 390; a loan of \$196,407 to Greater Wilkes-Barre Industrial Fund, Inc., toward a \$654,690 plant being occupied by the Fall Corporation for production of fibrous glass products with employment of 195, in Pittston a loan of \$64,500 to Pittston Area Industrial Development Corps toward a \$215,000 plant of Textile Processes Inc., employing 130 in textile printing. Scranton's loans were for Anemostat Corporation, employing 300 in production of air defusing equipment and for Stacor Equipment Corp. employing 100 in producing furniture components. Loans for Lansford, Milton, Erie and Point Marion also received final approval. Loans for plants in Berwick and Old Forge received preliminary approval.

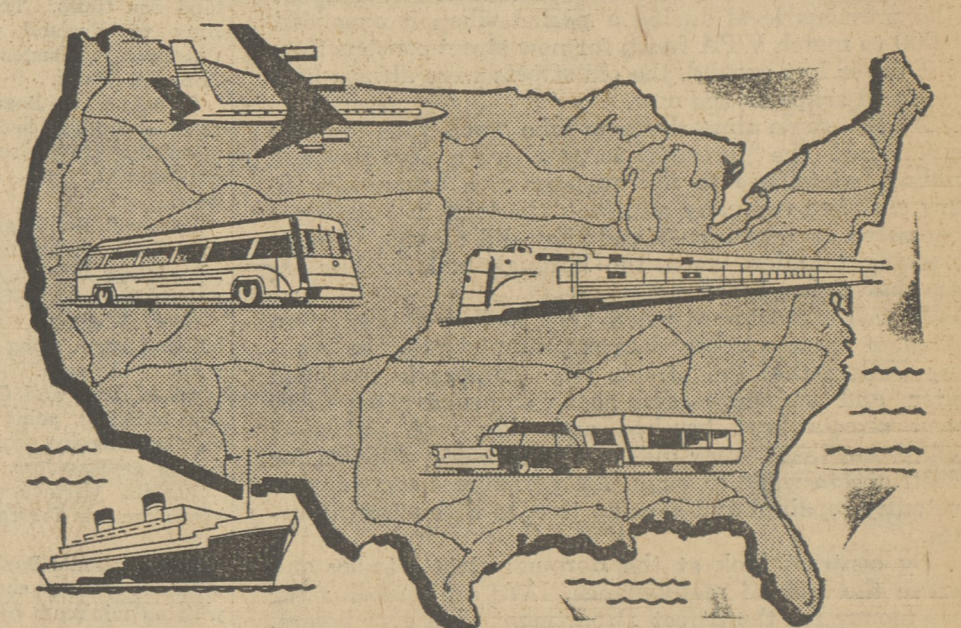

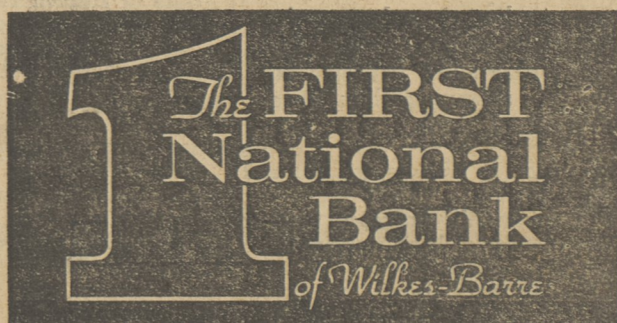
