United Fund Campaign Lowers Sights From Last Year's Goal

The directors of Wyoming Valley's United Fund Torch Campaign have lowered their sights by some \$20,000 from last year's drive goal.

After a meeting Wednesday the directors said they hoped to RAISE \$1,194,855 FOR THE 1962 CAMPAIGN. Campaign Chairman J. J. O'Malley noted that this amount was \$19,855 more than was raised in the 1961 drive. Last year's United Fund effort, however, fell \$40,000 short of its planned total.

THE LOWER GOAL was arrived at after an examination of the area's economic condition and past campaign results.


In another development Wednesday the United Fund offered TO ALLOCATE \$32,600 OVER A THREE YEAR PERIOD TO A PLANNED PARK AND RECREATION BOARD for Luzerne County.

Establishment of the Board was urged to attract new tourists to the area. Under the terms of a Tourist Act passed by the State legislature in April, the State would match the allocation of the United Fund.

County Commissioners Edmund J. McCullough, Jarrett W. Jennings, and J. Bowden Northrup have under consideration a plan by which the United Fund would contribute \$16,300 to the project the first year, \$10,867 the second year, and \$5,434 the third year. The County would pay nothing the first year, \$6,283 the second year, and \$12,567 the third year. After that, the County would assume all expenses.

The County Commissioners plan further discussions with representatives of the Wilkes-Barre, Pittston, Nanticoke, and Hazleton Chambers of Commerce.

Meanwhile, the governor has taken a hands-off attitude to the whole affair. "The governor said it is his policy to let Legislature handle its own legislation," Bartlett commented.

THE OAK which inspired Joyce Kilmer to write his poem "Trees" is near death. "It's an out and out case of senility," says Dr. Edward B. Wilkins, director of campus planning at Rutgers University where the 300-year old tree stands. A dozen of the oak's branches failed to bloom this spring and a large gash developed in its trunk. Kilmer, who was killed in action during the First World War as a former Rutgers student.




