Ellsworth Collection Will Go On Sale At Meshoppen Next Week

One of the largest, if not the largest, collections of antique glass in northern Pennsylvania will be put up for auction next week starting Wednesday at 10 a.m. and continuing for four days at the Craig Hill Farm of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Ellsworth, six miles from Meshoppen.

Included will be all of the glass collected and held intact by Mr. Ellsworth over a period of thirty years. Dealers who have known of the collection and been impressed by its beauty and scope have been unable over the years to persuade Mr. Ellsworth to sell any of it.

Now in failing health he has decided to dispose of it. The Ellsworths are the parents of Joseph Ellsworth, Lehman High School teacher.

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Shiber of Dallas who are noted for their own collection of glass, say that the Ellsworth collection is one of the finest and most complete to be found anywhere. Especially noteworthy are the hundreds of pieces of bisque augmented by green, amber, vaseline, amethyst in many patterns including early wild flower in plates, goblets, compotes, decanters and cruets.

Pitchers and tumbler sets include milk glass, frosted, log cabin, green and gold, red and gold, carnival, cut glass, blue enameled, green enameled red block enameled cranberry, hob nail, three face and many others.

Because of the illness of both Mr. and Mrs. Ellsworth there will be no preview. The merchandise to be sold each day will be on display in a large tent.

A cattle dealer and farmer, Mr. Ellsworth always enjoyed showing his collection to friends rather than selling odd pieces.

Bearing a striking resemblance to Abraham Lincoln, he was a familiar figure at all country auctions throughout Northeastern Pennsylvania where he earned a reputation for going the limit for items that struck his fancy.
