### Indian Mound Uncovered At Lake Ganoga Cottage

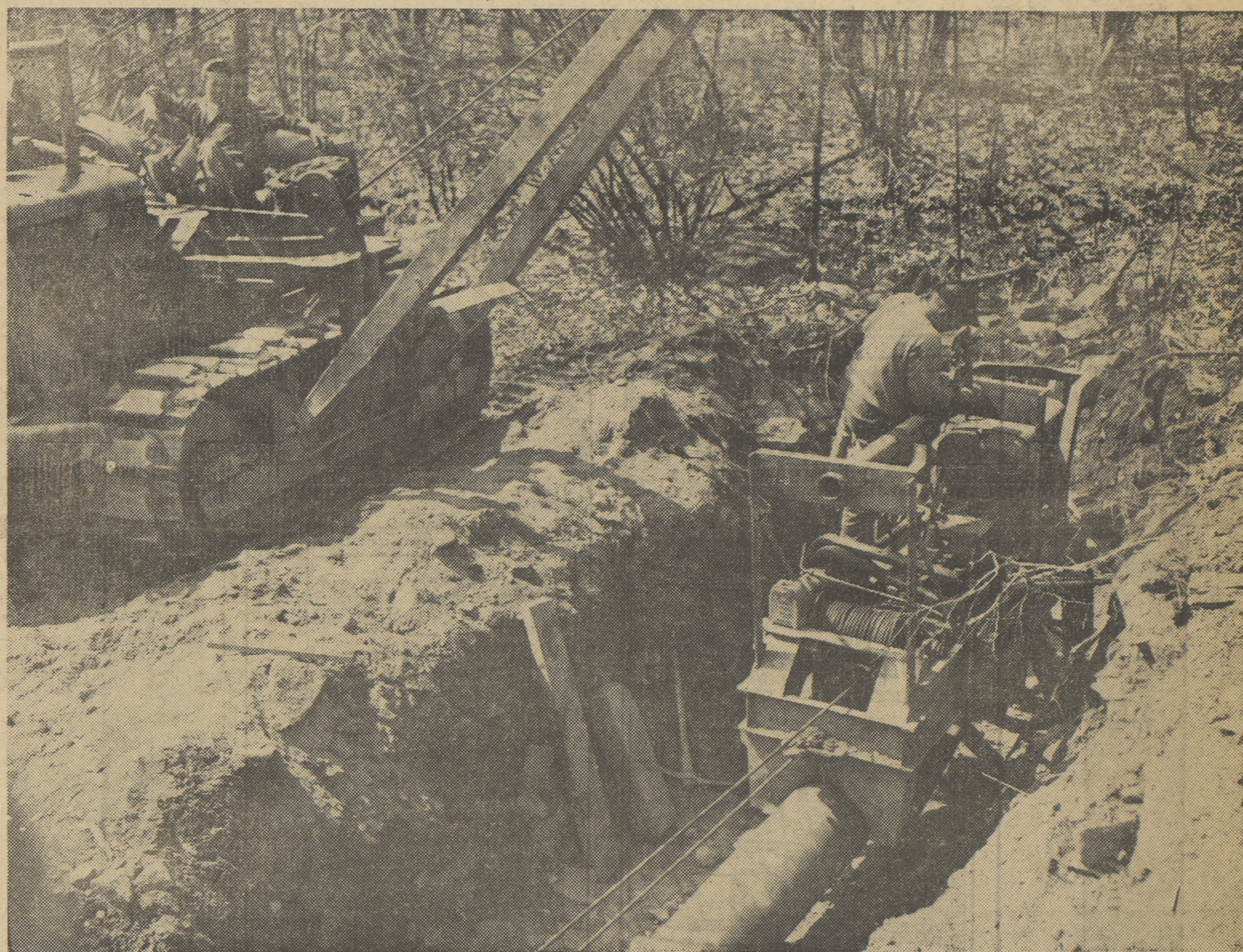
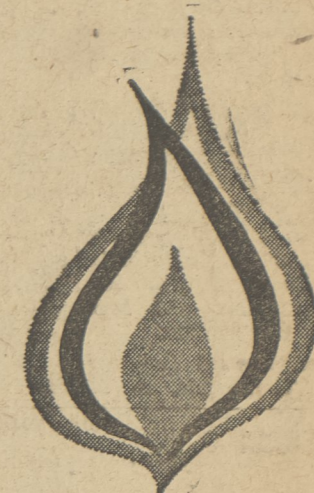
