The reception was held in the church parlors after which the couple left for Niagara Falls and Canada.

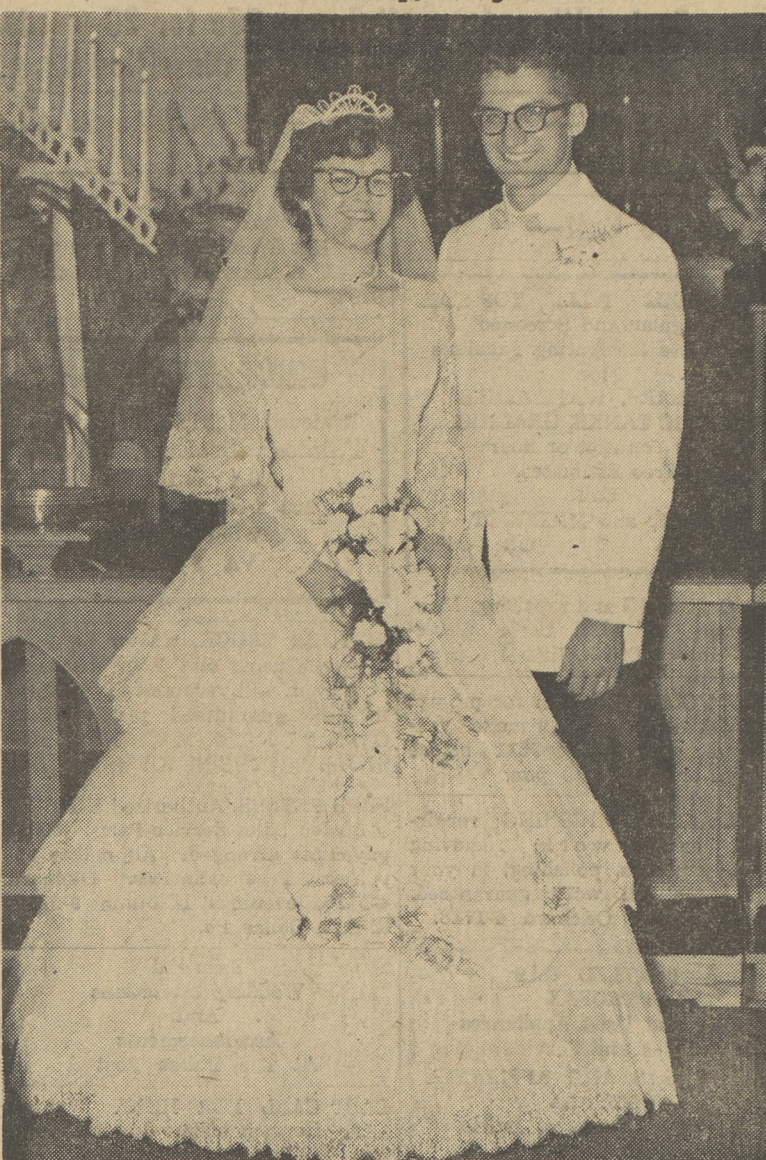

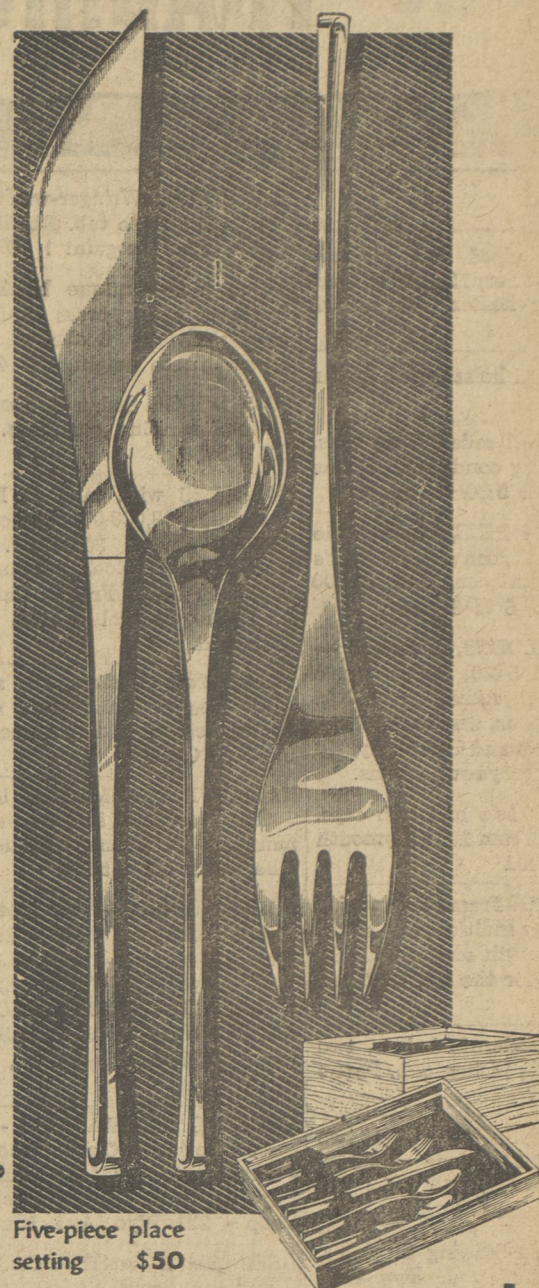
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
