

16th Annual Bk. Mountain Dog Show To Draw A Record Entry Of 482 Dogs

Breaking a record of ten years standing, the sixteenth annual dog show of Back Mountain Kennel Club has attracted a record entry of 482 dogs for this year's event at Kingston Armory, Saturday. These dogs will come from a dozen or more states for the verdict of an international panel of expert judges.

A total of 74 different breeds and varieties will be exhibited in the conformation classes, in addition to the 35 dogs of various breeds entered in the obedience trial. The three varieties of Poodles have the largest entry with 52.

One of the next largest entries is Cocker Spaniels, to be judged this year by William E. Lahn, Still Avenue, Dallas. Other judges will come from Canada, Michigan, Texas and New Jersey.

Judging will start at 10 a.m. and continue until Best-in-Show around 4 or 5 o'clock. It is a benched show and all dogs entered may be seen in the ring or on their benches between noon and 3 p.m.

Although Back Mountain Kennel Club serves the entire Wyoming

Valley in the interests of pure-bred dogs, local residents are prominent in its leadership and in planning this year's record-breaking show.

Harold Davis Dies After Heart Attack

Mr. Davis, only 37, died Tuesday morning at Nesbitt Hospital, where he had been a patient for three weeks, since being admitted by ambulance suffering from a heart attack.

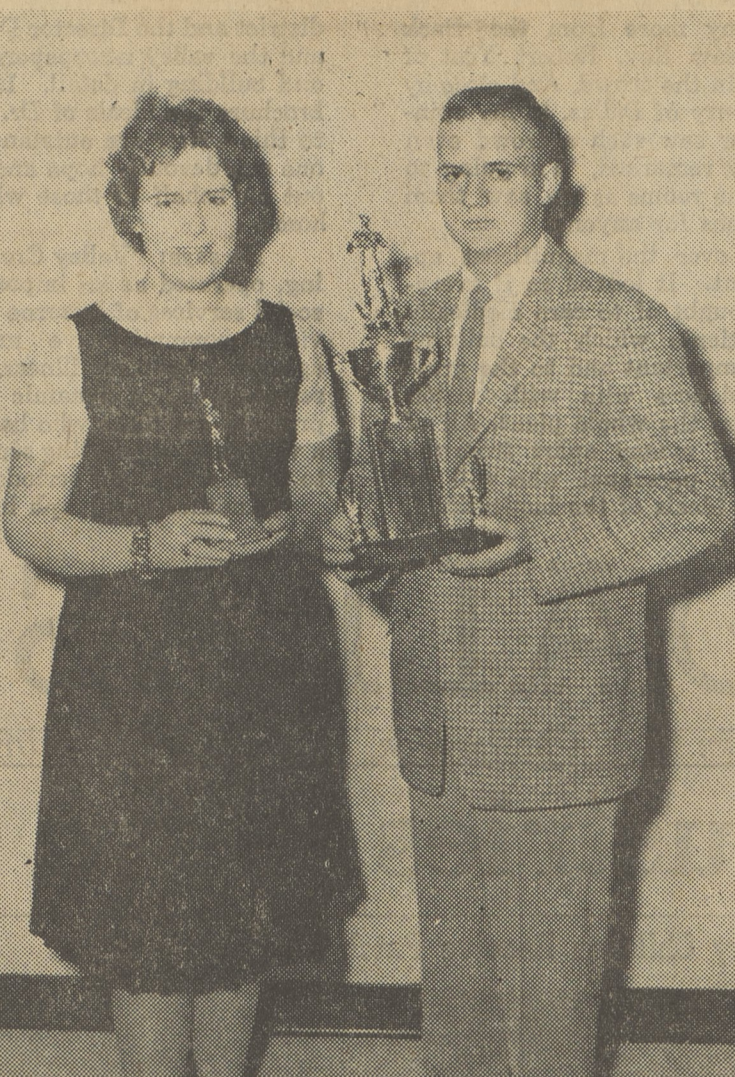
Mr. and Mrs. Davis collaborated in operation of the Davis Cleaning in Trucksville, a business launched in 1950. His death removes from the Back Mountain scene one of its most energetic and far-seeing young businessmen.

He was born in Indiana, moving with his family to Syracuse, then as a young boy to Wyoming Valley. He graduated from Forty Fort High School in 1942, and enlisted in the U.S. Army. He served in Germany with the 887th Military Police. Upon discharge, he attended National Institute of Dry Cleaning at Silver Springs, Md., finishing in 1949.

He belonged to St. Therese's Church, and was a member of the George Shupp Bowling League. He was vice president of Dallas Lions Club.

He is survived by his widow, the former Alice Wienoski; his parents, Mr and Mrs. Ben Davis; two children, Nancy and Harold Jr., students at Gate of Heaven School; a brother Robert, in Buffalo; a sister, Mrs. Robert Kappler, Dallas Township.

16 Year Old Boy Shoots Himself, Dies Of Wound

Parents Hear Shot, Find Youth Dying In His Bedroom

A sixteen year old Franklin Township boy died by his own hand Monday morning. Bruce Garrity, roused by his father John Garrity, to get ready to go to school at Wyoming Seminary where he had entered the junior year in September, shot himself in the chest with a .22 calibre revolver.

Wrapped in blankets by his parents after being seen by Dr. T. E. Mashella of Philadelphia, on a hunt-

ing vacation at Lake Louise, the boy was rushed in the family station wagon to Nesbitt Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival. Postmortem showed the slug lodged against the spine, after passing through the aorta.

Mr. and Mrs. Garrity were at breakfast when they heard the shot. Mr. Garrity, finding his son fatally wounded, ran for the dock at Lake Louise where Dr. Mashella was standing.

Bruce had taken summer school work to prepare for entrance to Wyoming Seminary, after spending a little over a year at Westmoreland, where he had been a transfer from West Side Catholic High School.

The boy normally accompanied his father to Kingston, dropping off at Seminary while Mr. Garrity proceeded to his service station at the Narrows Shopping Center. Bruce was well acquainted with firearms. He had been hunting on

Saturday, the first day of the Small Game Season. The revolver he used was reportedly one which had been given him several months ago by his father.

Born at Darby the boy was the son of John E. and Dorothy Goeringer Garrity. He was a member of Stella Presbyterian Church, Forty Fort.

He leaves his parents; brothers and sisters: Christine, Glenn, Paul and Lynn, at home; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Garrity, Wilkes-Barre; maternal grandmother, Mrs. M. K. Goeringer, Wynnewood.

He was buried yesterday at Oaklawn Cemetery, Rev. Robert D. McClure officiating.
