Two local young women were recently cited for scholarships at Marywood College, Scranton, Penna.

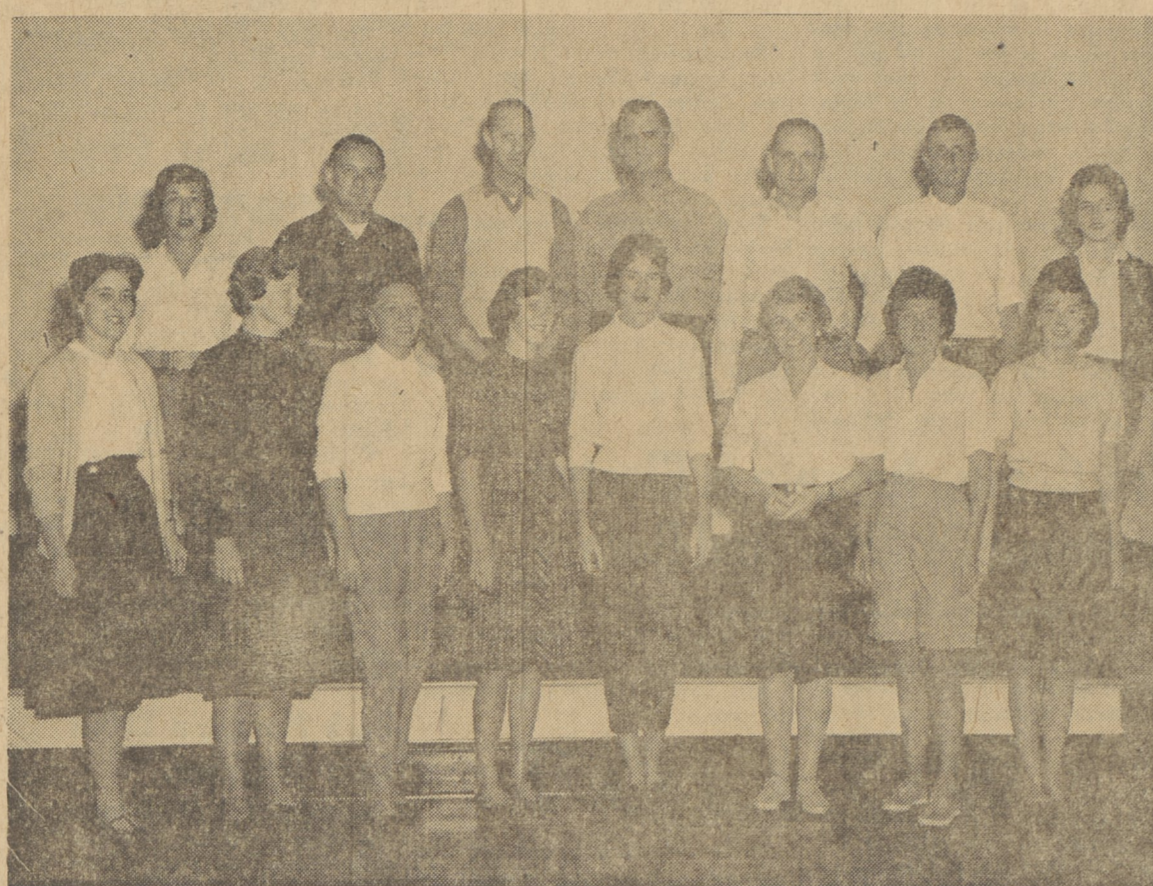
