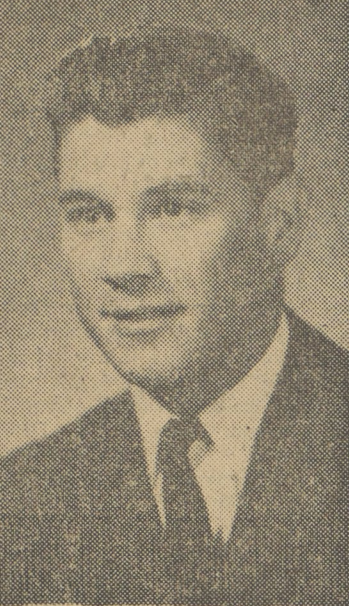

Lake Louise Bull Has 10 Tested Daughters

Lake Louise Cora's Traveler, registered Guernsey bull, owned by Raymond Goeringer, Herbert V. Ekstran, and Western Glow Farms, Inc., Bow, Washington and James P. Olson, Mount Vernon, Washington, has become a Summarized Sire, according to the American Guernsey Cattle Club.

"Traveler", has 10 tested daughters that have made 10 official production records. Their average production is 10,385 pounds of milk and 518 pounds of fat, when converted to a twice-daily milking, 305-day, mature equivalent basis.

This fine Guernsey bull was bred by Raymond Goeringer, Dallas, Pennsylvania. This bull's sire was Western Glow Lou's Royal and its dam was Douglas Baroness Cora, that posted an official production record of 13,261 pounds of milk and 696 pounds of fat.

"Traveler", also has had eight of his registered daughters classified with an average rating of Desirable.

Planning And Redevelopment In Nine West Side Boroughs

Thirty-one members of nine borough planning commissions forming the West Side Regional Area recently met to hear about proposed community planning and redevelopment for their areas.

Boroughs represented were Court-dale, Edwardsville, Forty Fort, Kingston, Larksville, Luzerne, Plymouth, Pringle and Swoyersville. Wilbur L. Shorts, chairman of the West Side Regional Planning Commission, presided.

Edward Heiselberg, Director of Planning of the Commission gave the background of West Side Regional Planning Commission, and the new local planning commissions,

seven of which have been recently created. Comprehensive plans and developmental controls will be prepared for each of the nine boroughs by the end of 1964, and these will be coordinated into a regional plan.

In general, Community Planning consists of goals or objectives, research and surveys, plans, and developmental controls. Plans made for the West Side will be composed of major roads including highways, transit, schools, recreation areas, utilities, including sewerage systems, community facilities, land use plans, general appearance, and urban renewal areas. Development controls will consist of zoning

ordinances and subdivision regulations, although building and housing codes will be made available.

The Housing and Home Finance Agency will pay three-quarters of the cost of preparing community plans, and the councils of the nine boroughs have agreed to pay the remaining local share, over a three-year period.

Mr. Henry O'Karma, Executive Director of the Wilkes-Barre Redevelopment Authority, informed the group of the Federal and State funds available through Urban Renewal, and described the differences between development, rehabilitation and conservation. He described the Wilkes-Barre projects, and indicated what several other communities were doing. He stated that seven-eighths of the cost of doing urban renewal projects is usually available from the State and Federal govern-

ments, and that the community's share need not all be in cash.

He emphasized the need for a County Redevelopment Authority to enable boroughs and townships to take advantage of the large sums of Federal and State money available under urban renewal projects. He indicated that the West Side communities were wise in developing comprehensive plans if they were to take advantage of urban renewal.
