CHRISTMAS - 1961

The observance of the birth of Christ has become so sub-Christian and secularized that it is in danger of losing its real meaning. The trappings of the occasion-the Santa Clauses, the Christmas trees, the advertising and the shopping, the wholesale exchange of gifts, the flood of greeting-cards, the parties and the feasting-are now so all-absorbing that the historic significance of the day is almost forgotten.

One feature of the season, however, still keeps it from taking on a wholey secular character—the Christmas carols. They ring out the essential meaning of Christmas-the Good News that man has not been left to grope in the dark after God, but that God has come to us in a way we can recognize and understand. They proclaim that the gulf between man and God, which cannot be bridged from man's side, has been bridged from God's side.

> "Joy to the world, the Lord is come, Let earth receive her King.'

"Hark, the herald angels sing

Glory to the new-born King."

"Christmas, awake, salute the happy morn Whereon the Saviour of the world was born."

So long as such songs are in our hearts and on the air we still have the reality of Christmas.

These songs not only keep the true spirit of Christmas, but also call us back to the central core of the Christian faith. If Jesus is only an inspiring teacher or a moral leader or a winsome character, our Christmas carols are hardly more than sentimental nonsense. Christmas is our clearest affirmation that Jesus is not simply an example of what we should strive to be, but God's grace reaching down to us in redeeming love. Christmas keeps us from forgetting that Jesus is not only a great and good man, but also a Saviour.

According to the Christmas carols the birth of Jesus is the greatest single event in history. We recognize this in our calendar by dating events before and after His coming. We thereby acknowledge that a life was lived which has changed the course of history more than any other, and that no subsequent event has been sufficiently epochal to afford the ground for starting a new way of reckoning time.

If our little and transient lives are to have any real significance they must be related to some central point in history which gives meaning to the whole. Without that, history iis only a senseless urge of incomprehensible forces. Christmas recalls us to a deeper perception of reality. It bids us never forget that history has a central meaning, and that this meaning is found in Christ. It is this conviction that must be maintained if we are really to have Christmas.


