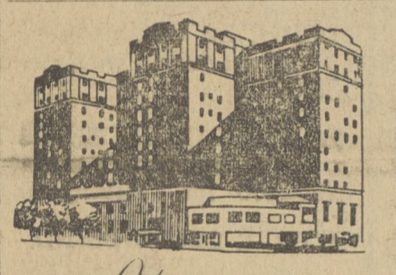

Elementary English, explained Mr. Austin, is confined in the main to the fundamentals, with writing an important part of instruction, and reading and spelling related to other subjects.

Mastery of grammatical principles is stressed in Junior High School, with composition and book reports for constant practice. Public speaking and oral English employs basic principles of good diction.

Development of written proficiency in preparation for college takes the forefront in senior high school, with original composition stressed. The aim is a theme a week. Commercial and industrial arts students lay emphasis on practical writing, and on reading with comprehension.

A survey of colleges, said Mr. Molley, shows that students are expected to have mastered all fundamentals and be ready for advanced English, with a vocabulary based on use, and the accent on accuracy.

Following a question period, Dr. Robert A. Mellman expressed pride in accomplishments in the field of English in Dallas schools, saying that students going on to college have been well prepared in English.

Lisses' Article In Optometrist Third Major Report Focuses On Contact

Dr. Aaron Lisses, Dallas and Edwardsville optometrist, has a scholarly article on the fitting of contact lenses in the November-December issue of Pennsylvania Optometrist. Dr. Lisses feels that the future of contact lenses is almost unlimited, permitting abandonment of bi and tri-focal glasses even in cases where the correction needed is very great.

Dr. Lisses follows step by step the fitting and adjustment necessary to get satisfactory results. Dr. Lisses is a 1944 graduate of P.S.C.O., active in the Northeastern Society. He is a past public relations director, and serves as Vision Conservation Institute Director of Area 10.

In 1947 he was given a book from the Pittsburgh Optometric Society in recognition of presentation of a paper on the Lang co-ordinator. Three years later his paper on Visual Characteristics in Industrial Surveys appeared in the Optometric Weekly.

The article on contact lenses recently published is his third major research report.
