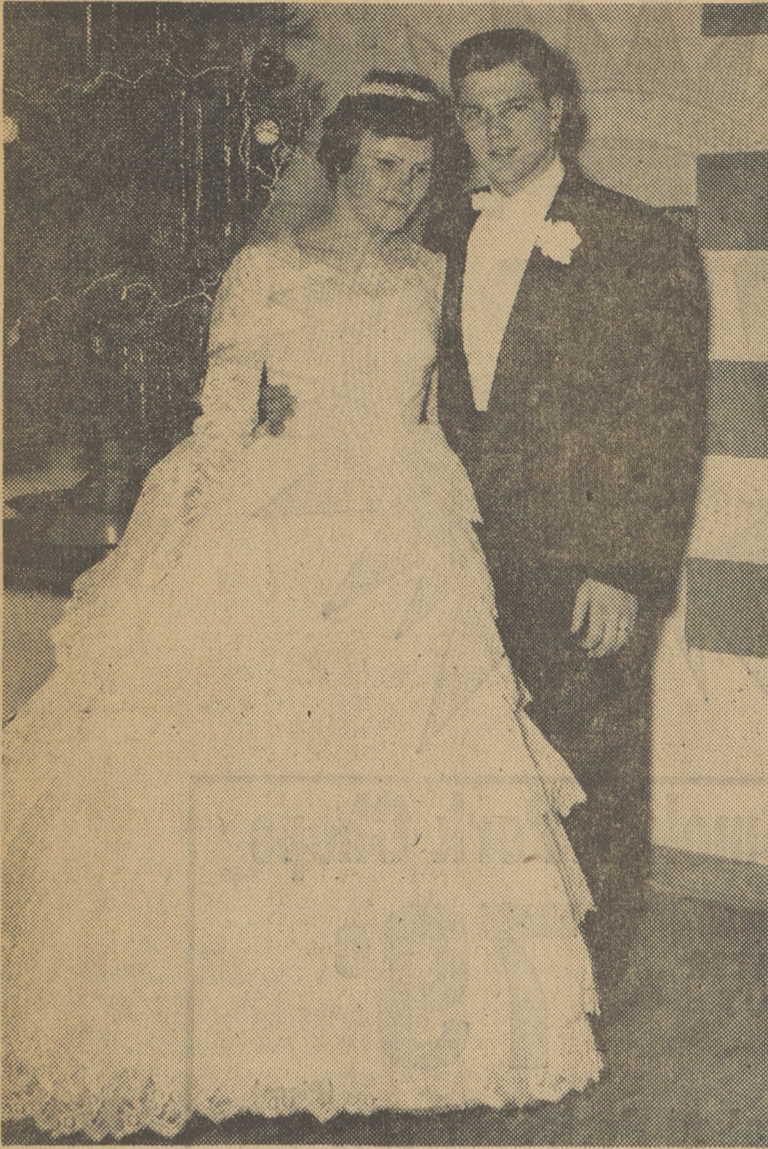


Married December 23

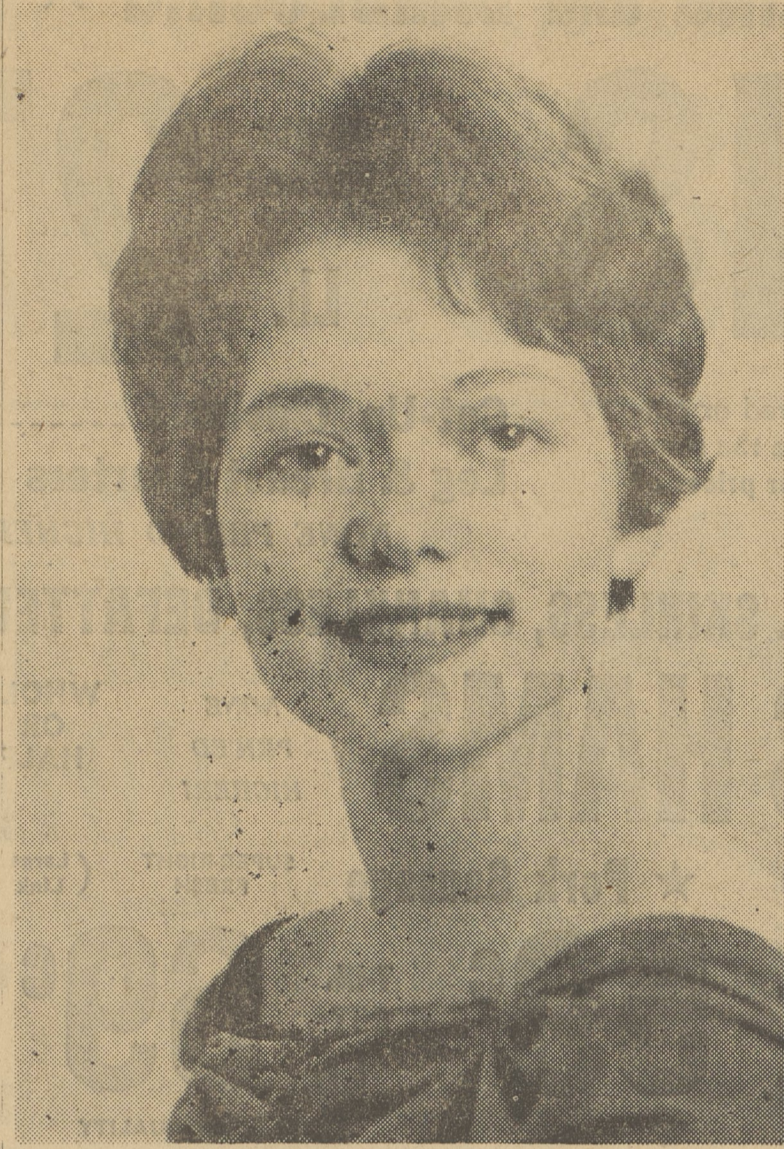

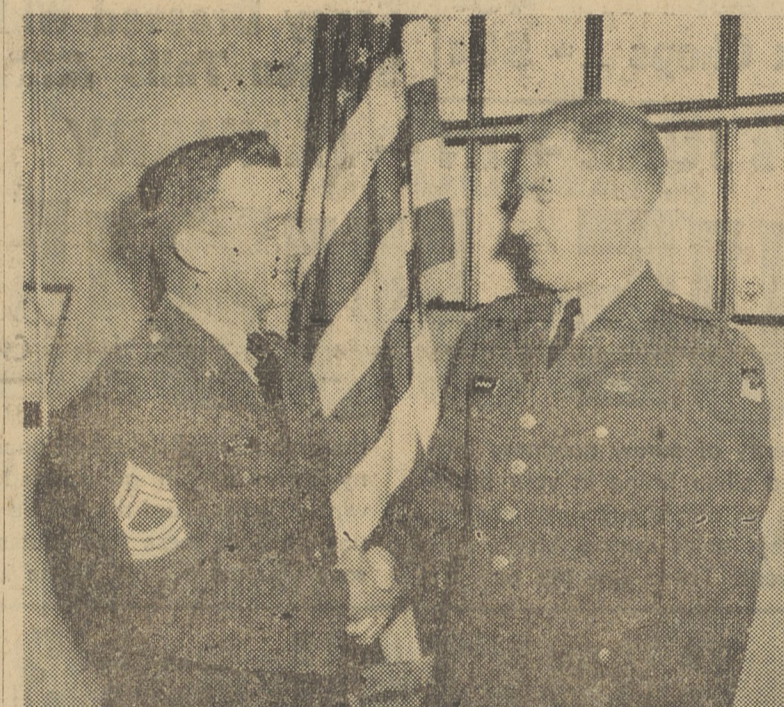
PHYLLIS ESTHER GLASSER
