Redwings At Feeder

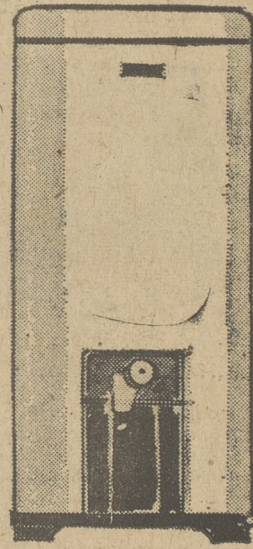
