#### Shavertown Bible Church Plans Special Meetings

Dr. Lewis W. Button, deputatational evangelist for the Open Air Campaigners, will conduct special meetings in Shavertown Bible Church, Thursday through Sunday at 7:30 P.M., says the pastor, Rev. Russell Edmonson.

This organization began in Australia, seventy years ago. Two evangelists came to America August 1957, and since that time, others have been added.
