Study Of Reading At Misericordia

Problems At All Levels Workshop To Consider

College Misericordia's Third Annual Reading Conference is scheduled for March 23-24, and is designed for the regular classroom teacher who desires to learn techniques and procedures for teaching of reading at all levels.

Registration will begin on Friday, March 23, at 6 p.m. At 8 p.m. a general session will open the conference with the keynote address of Dr. Morton Botel, assistant superintendent of Bucks County Schools. Dr. Botel will discuss A Total Approach to Reading. Chairman will be the Right Rev. Monsignor John J. Maher, LL.D., Superintendent of Schools in the Scranton Diocese.

Saturday's registration is at 8 a.m. Three workshops follow, planned for teachers of three levels. The workshop devoted to High School Reading Instruction in the Content Area will offer study of the problems met by secondary school teachers of social studies, science, and mathematics. Leader of this discussion will be Rosemary G. Wilson, Assistant Director Curriculum Office, Philadelphia Public Schools; chairman, Anthony Marchakitus, Lake-Lehman Area School District; recorders, Natalie Waytell, Luzerne Borough Schools, and Donald Murphy, Wilkes Barre City School District.

A workshop on The Slow Learner in the Classroom will consider the problems met by teachers on the junior high school level. Leader will be Dr. Betty Davis, Professor of Education, Pennsylvania State University; chairman, Mary McAndrew, Wilkes-Barre School District; recorders, Mrs. Eva Chilson, Kingstown Borough Schools, and Mrs. Mae Shypula, Wilkes-Barre City School District.

The Teaching Of Reading In The Elementary Grades will concentrate on the problem of grouping for instruction, the various approaches to word recognition, and the readiness program as a preventive of difficulties in reading. Dr. Henry Murphy, Professor of Education at Boston University, will lead. John J. Mulhern, Dallas School District, will be chairman; recorders will be Mrs. Martha Gormley, Hazleton City School District, and Mrs. Grace Martin, Lake-Lehman Area School District.

A post-luncheon session is planned for Saturday. Dr. Richard F. McNichols, Superintendent, Scranton City School District, will be chairman. Main speaker will be Sister Mary Caroline, I. H. M., author, lecturer, and teacher from San Bernardino, California. Exhibits of current text-books, reading materials, and equipment will be displayed during the conference.

In the second round of League play-offs Saturday night, St. Therese's surprised fans and skeptics to upset highly-touted Harveys Lake 63-58!

Saints Down Lake

In the St. Therese's-Harveys Lake game, a hot third quarter in which St. Therese's outscored the Lakers 20-13 proved to be the difference. The score was knotted at 16-all at the end of the first quarter and the Lakers enjoyed a slight 27-24 lead at halftime. At the end of the third quarter, St. Therese's had the upper hand at 44-40, and then outscored the Lakers 19-18 in the final stanza to put the game on ice.

Huntsville outscored Prince of Peace 31-12! "Pooch" Kozick was the high for the winners with 14 while Bob Coolbaugh with 14 and Jim Thomas with 11 led for the losers.
