Three things at the Library Book Club meeting in the Annex on Monday contributed to the enjoyment of the largest group attending in months: A quick review of "Ghosts in Old Houses" given by Mrs. Charles Frantz; a fascinating demonstration of decorated Easter eggs presented by Mrs. Leonard Adamshick; and a tea-table decorated in a spring motif of African violets and pink candles, presided over by Mrs. Prosper Wirt and Mrs. Fred Howell.

Mrs. Frantz gave just enough of a book review to insure James Reynolds, an enthusiastic reader audience. The book may be obtained at Back Mountain Memorial Library. Mr. Reynolds, an artist, had not intended to write a book, merely travel about, making pictures of old American houses; but when he spotted seven highwaymen hanging from the branches of a tree in New England, in advance of reading the ghost story about their ill-fated end, he felt that he must do something about it.

Mr. Adamshick's Easter eggs, fragile confections hanging from an Easter egg tree, were unbelievably beautiful. Some of the eggs were painstakingly cut to make tiny jewel caskets lined with silk and decorated with seed pearls, their delicate little hinges permitting the tops to be raised.
