The baseball team has played four league games has three more to play, with Nanticoke on the 17, Newport on the 21, and Wilkes-Barre Township on the 24.

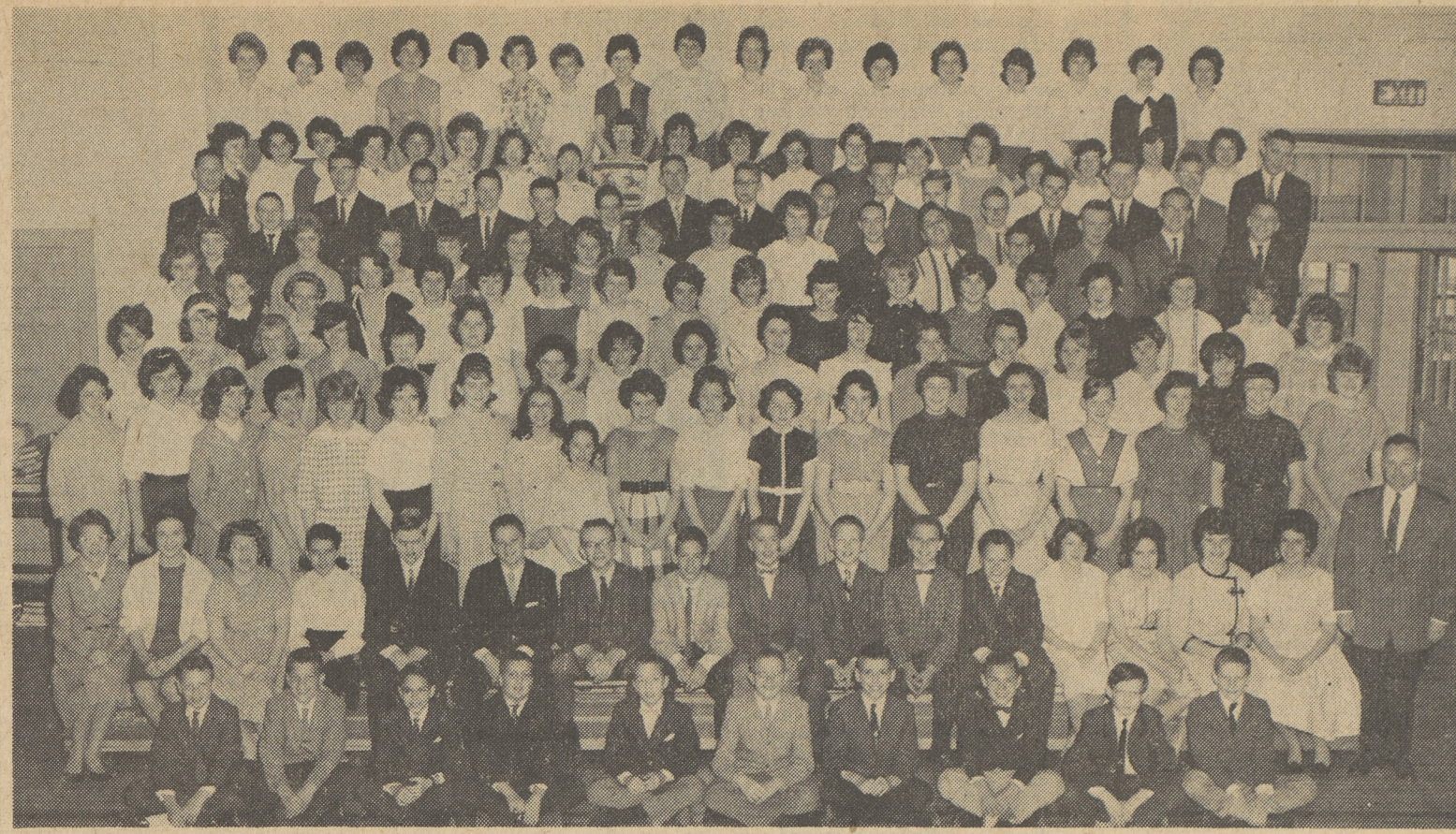

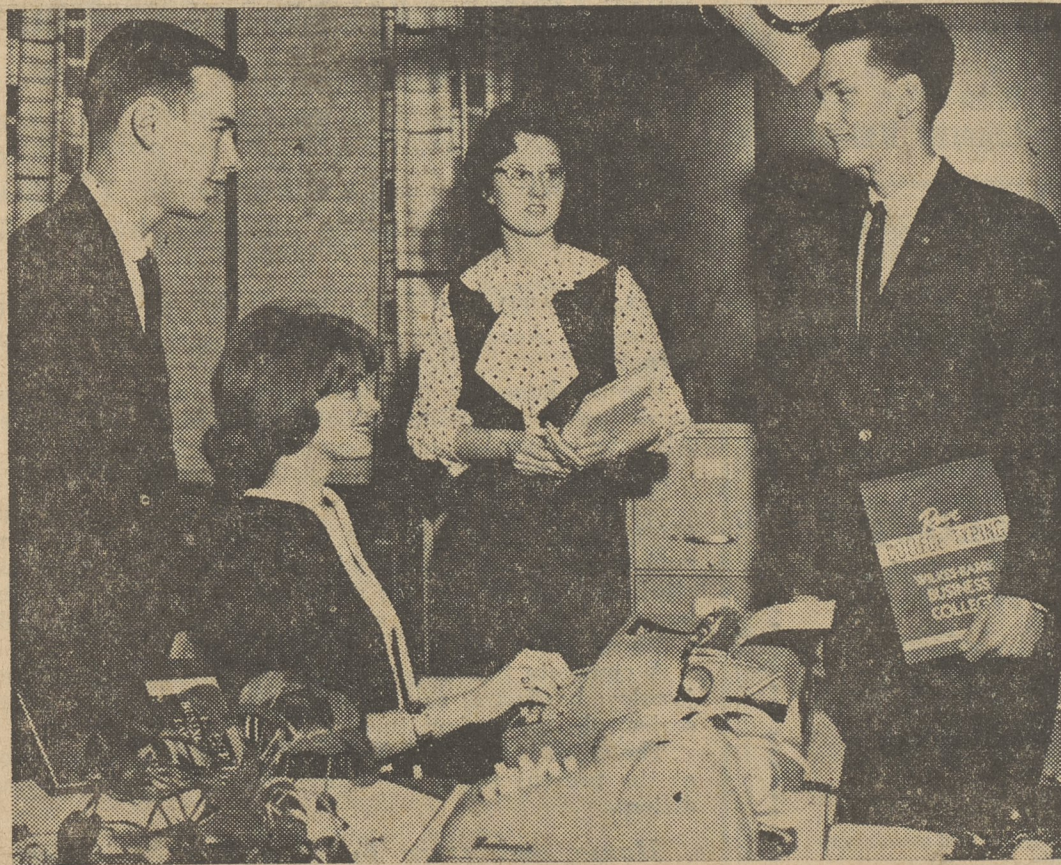
